NEWS FROM OTTAWA.

Another Liberal Minister for the Bench—Writs for Two More By Elections.

OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—Word reached the office of the dominion exhibitions commissioner today that the Canadian pavilion at St. Louis is now complete. A telegram from the office of the director general warns the Canadian authorities to push forward their exhibits without delay, as a congestion of freight is feared. Five car loads of exhibits will be dispatched from Ottawa this week.

The government does not intend to bring down a bill next session granting provincial autonomy in the Northwest territories. The excuse is that the government proposes to postpone the determination of this matter till the territories gain their full representation of members in the next parliament, when they will have a fairer chance to express their wishes of that part of the dominion than is possible today. During the session authority was taken to appoint two additional senators for the Northwest territories, making four in all. It is now announced these will not be appointed till the next parliament, when the territories get additional representation in the commons.

The government press is asked to announce that a railway expert be employed by the railway commission as required from time to time. Such a course is, however, impossible. The commissioners realize they must have an independent man with a thorough knowledge of railroad rates and will get him.

Hon. Mr. Prefontaine has purchased ten submarine bells at a cost of \$2,000 each, and it will take about \$500 annually to keep them in order. The bells will be located on the Atlantic sea coast and the Gulf.

Hon. Henry George Carroll, solicitor general, has been appointed a judge of the superior court of the province of Quebec, for the district of Gaspé, in the place of Justice Dill, who has retired. Justice Carroll had a seat in the commons since 1921. This leaves a vacancy for Kamouraska.

Rodolphe Lemieux, P. Gaspé, has been appointed solicitor general in the place of Mr. Carroll, and will in all likelihood be sworn into office next week. Mr. Lemieux is in the city, and is being congratulated tonight, on his appointment.

The writ for Gaspé has been issued, and the nomination takes place on the 20th of February. The returning officer will fix the date of the election, which will take place some three weeks later, the constituency being a large one.
