CHARLOTTE COUNTY LIBERALS IN BIG CONVENTION CHOOSE W. F. TODD CANDIDATE

Hon. Wm. Pugsley Present and Given Great Reception

Wm. F. Todd of St. Stephen was nominated as the liberal standard bearer in the approaching election, at the Convention held in St. Stephen Monday. Out of 123 delegates entitled to seats in the convention, 118 were present. N. Marks Mills was elected chairman and Fred B. Hill, Sec'y. A. B. O'Neill, W. W. Clarke and John O'Brien were appointed committee on credentials.

LETETE

Hon. Mr. Pugsley was asked to address the convention and was given a rousing reception on rising to respond. He first expressed his gratification with the size and spirit of the convention. He could not say just when the election was to be held, but it was well to be prepared.

SEEK TO BE ELECTED

He was sure that that the candidate of the convention would receive the hearty support of the party and would be elected. He spoke of the prudent and enlightened legislation enacted by the present government which had at its head a statesman who had never been surpassed in the history of Canada. It was a splendid thing to have so grand a leader. He was a Frenchman by blood, but English to the core and no man had outdone him in his efforts to draw closer the union between Canada and Great Britain. Dr. Pugsley was sure that the people would decide that Laurier should carry Canada forward as before. The speaker was his humble lieutenant in this province and he called for him a renewal of support.

He briefly contrasted conditions in Canada in 1896 under the old government which had gone mad in its policy of protection to the manufacturer at the expense of the common people, and conditions today with all that had been accomplished under the new tariff and the British preference. He spoke of the magnificent development of the West and of the eastern ports and predicted a further and greater development of these ports in the next five years. In the coming election they had to look not merely at the men, but at the policies they represent. If the government is sustained the march of progress will be greater than ever. In his department he could do as much or more than any other minister. The government is straining every nerve to bring Canadian trade through Canadian ports. He spoke of appropriations already secured for public works in Charlotte county and outlined larger plans for the future. No predecessor in office had shown greater solicitude for the welfare of the people.

DEFENDED HIMSELF

In conclusion Dr. Pugsley defended himself from the attacks made by Mr. Foster and others and promised his aid to the candidate chosen by the convention. Very hearty cheers marked the close of his address.

The nomination of a candidate was proceeded with and the name of William F. Todd was presented by R. E. Armstrong and Geo. M. Byron. It was received with applause that was deafening.

Mr. Todd spoke briefly, accepting the nomination so heartily tendered him, and prophesied victory if all worked together and to the close of the polls. The meeting closed with cheers for Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Todd.

The candidate is the youngest son of the late Freeman H. Todd, and represented this county in the local assembly from 1898 to 1902.

A public meeting was held in Watson's hall in the evening at which R. E. Armstrong, Hon. G. F. Hill, Geo. M. Byron, N. Marks Mills, Hon. Wm. Pugsley and W. F. Todd spoke.

In a ringing speech Mr. Pugsley spoke on the questions of the day, and dealt fully with the land scandals dealing with the Saskatchewan Lands Company alleged scandal. There was no doubt an advantage for a maritime county in having a Minister of Public Works in sympathy with the aspirators, and while he must consider the needs of all Canada, he considered the Maritime Provinces entitled to their promotion. He had not given this county one dollar to which it was not entitled, and what had been given was only for what could be used in the present year, the rest would follow. He acknowledged his indebtedness to Senator Gilmor, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Byron and others in determining the needs of the people of Charlotte. In the House, Hon. Mr. Foster had advocated the indictment of any minister of the crown who promised a public work during the process of a campaign. If he had made it an indictable offence for any Minister to provide any public works, Mr. Pugsley did not think that Mr. Foster would ever be indicted for anything accomplished in Charlotte County. On Prince Edward Island only last week this same Mr. Foster had pledged his support to the tunnel project. Personally he would not be

deterred in his efforts to furnish the people what they needed in public works so long as the treasury warranted the expenditures.

PROLONGED APPLAUSE

W. F. Todd was received with prolonged applause of a most assuring character as he rose to speak. He dealt with the issue of the day in an able manner and was frequently cheered by the large assembly.

Senator Gilmor spoke briefly but enthusiastically and the meeting closed with cheers for the King and the candidate. A banquet was enjoyed by the delegates at the Windsor Hotel in the evening.
