

MOUNT ALLISON COMMITTEE MET A GENEROUS RESPONSE

Nearly \$4,000 Secured in Canvass, Bringing Total up to \$37,648 without Conditional \$5,000—Much Enthusiasm Shown by all Interested.

As a result of the second day's canvass by the Mount Allison Committee, the sum of \$3,921 has been added to the subscription list, making a total now of between \$37,000 and \$38,000. Deducting the \$5,000 additional subscription, which has been promised, this leaves a balance of slightly more than \$32,000 still to be raised in order to complete the amount required from St. John. Members of the committee had expected to close the canvass last evening, but during the day it was found impossible to see a considerable number of persons from whom generous subscriptions were expected. As a result of this, it has been decided to continue the campaign today, and the committee are convinced that when these prospective subscribers are all seen, the full amount will have been pledged.

THE LATEST MARINE NOTES OF THE WORLD

SHIPWRECKED CREW LANDED—ED—STEAMER SUNK. Dangers to Navigation—Ferry and Barge Burned—Cargo Valuations—Harbor Front Notes—A New Steamer.

SHIPWRECKED CREW LANDED. Port Huron, Mich., April 22.—The crew of the steamship Uganda which encountered heavy ice and sank in the Straits of Mackinac Saturday night, arrived here today on board the steamship Donaldson, which took them of the sinking vessel. The steamship went down with 100,000 bushels of corn, bound for Milwaukee to Buffalo. The crew reported that after the Uganda received a bad cut by the ice she filled so rapidly that she could not be accomplished with the pumps.

NEW STEAMER FRIEDA. Portland, Me., April 23.—The new steamer Frieda, which the Union Sulphur Co. of New York recently placed in the sulphur trade between Sabine, Texas, and northern ports, made her first visit here yesterday, she having a cargo of about 4,000 tons of sulphur which will be unloaded at the Maine Central wharf.
