GRAND FALLS FOLK SPENT A GOOD TIME ON VICTORIA DAY

Threatening Weather Turned Fine and Programme of Field Sports was Much Enjoyed—Boy Scouts Active.

Grand Falls, May 24.—The morning of the 24th dawned gloomy and grey portending a steady downpour of rain, and many anxious eyes were skyward turned, as the boys, old and young, had promised the town, folk a treat in field sports, and the people en masse turned out to enjoy the sights. So there was joy when the clouds rolled away and a fine day was assured.

The feature of the day's celebration was the introduction of the Grand Falls troupe of the Baden Powell boy scouts, organized and trained by W. R. Wright, late of the army, at present an employee of J. L. White, M. P., and associated with Mr. Wright is the Rev. Mr. Chabree. This little company is composed largely of just small lads not in their teens, but clad in brand new khaki uniforms, Baden Powell hats and dressed with guide sticks, their faces serious, bodies strong and alert, movements alert and precise that little band of warriors presented a very interesting appearance.

Great praise is due Mr. Wright for his splendid work in "breaking in" and in so short a time the physical drilling of the Grand Falls troop Baden Powell Scouts. Mr. Chabree was standard bearer, and the scouts saluted the flag with great dignity.

Another interesting time was the formal opening of the Grand Falls Brass Band. It, too, is made up principally of young lads, quite new in their knowledge of musical brass instruments. Under the efficient teaching and management of Mr. Bonnell the band has prepared a delightful programme; one of the numbers being an accompaniment to the scouts physical drill, and it was especially interesting.

A tug-of-war between the men and Grand Falls troop Baden Powell boys was fought out, the latter carried away letting go down to defeat.

A game of baseball between St. Mary's College students of Van Buren, Maine, and Grand Falls boys was played at the Grand Falls hotel. The Daughters of All Saints' Club of Grand Falls presented most acceptably their little musical comedy called "Aladdin, or the Slave of the Lamp," to an appreciative audience at Edmunston. The house was packed to the doors. The club has been rehearsing under the direction of Mrs. Hand, wife of the rector of All Saints church here and has been most ably assisted by Mrs. Jay Kirkpatrick, Ronald Kirkpatrick, stage manager and property man. The proceeds go towards a rectory at Grand Falls.


MONCTON NEWS.

The Honorable Nell Primrose, second son of the Earl of Rosebery, is one of the British members of the peace conference of the English speaking countries just ended in New York, which was held for the purpose of discussing the centennial celebration of the Ghent Treaty of Peace. He is a most eligible and wealthy young bachelor, and he inherited a large fortune from his grandmother, the Baroness Rothschild. Mr. Primrose, in company with the Honorable Charles Thomas Mills, will visit Washington to see the President, and they will go as far west as Chicago.

The Honorable Charles T. Mills, M. P., is the son and heir of Lord Hillingford, of England, and he, like his friend, is one of the richest and most eligible bachelors in all England. Mr. Mills is the "baby" of the House of Commons. He is a staunch conservative and has a wonderful career predicted for him by those who know him. Mr. Mills is also in America attending the Peace conference of English speaking nations.

Ottawa, Ont., May 28.—In the Supreme Court today judgments were delivered in cases recently argued as follows:

Howard vs. Miller, the court being equally divided, the appeal stood dismissed, no costs being allowed.

Wigle vs. Gosselin, appeal dismissed with costs.

Gratton vs. La Banque D'Hotelage, appeal dismissed with costs.

Gundy et al. vs. Johnston, appeal dismissed with costs.

Evans vs. Norris, appeal dismissed with costs, Idlington J., dissenting.

Mutual Life Association vs. Sawyer, appeal allowed with costs.

Straford Fuel Company vs. Money et al., motion for issue of execution dismissed on the grounds that it had been made ex-parte, no notice having been given to the interested parties and the question being one of great importance.

Court then adjourned until Monday, June 10th.

GRANTED A DIVORCE.

Manchester, N. H., May 28.—Mrs. J. Wesley MacCallum, the wife of a former clergyman by that name here, was granted a divorce yesterday on the grounds of extreme cruelty. The minister, who is an evangelist, and has held pastorates in various cities and towns in New Brunswick, is now in Canada. Mrs. MacCallum alleged her evangelist husband struck her, knocked her down and choked her until she was blue in the face.

FIRE AT AMHERST.

Amherst, N. S., May 28.—A serious fire occurred in Amherst last night, when a large barn in the rear of the Spa Hotel caught fire. The hotel itself was in serious danger at times. The live stock in the barn was easily rescued. It is thought that the barn was ignited from a lighted cigarette butt or a dropped match. There is no insurance on the building, which was valued at \$300 or \$400. It will be a total loss.

Fredericton, May 28.—In the Royal Gazette today formal notice of application for incorporation of the Victoria Steamship Company, Limited, appears. The applicants are: Messrs. Robert Fitzandolph, W. G. Clark, E. G. Hoben, J. J. McCaffrey and Robert Scott, of this city, and F. Del. Clements and H. G. Harrison of St. John. The proposed authorized capitalization is \$20,000 and the par value of the shares is placed at \$25. The head offices of the company will be at Fredericton.

Mrs. Sarah J. McLean, Messrs. Robert A. McLean, Wm. J. McLean, Miss Violet Isabel McLean and Miss Valentine McLean of St. John, are applying for incorporation as R. D. McLean and Sons, Ltd., to carry on a general farm produce and dairy business at Ashburn, St. John. The proposed authorized capital is \$15,000.

The case will be heard at the autumn assizes. The writ is the outcome of some criticisms alleged to have been made by Mayor Graham to the work of Mr. Nutter on the court house under construction.

CANADIAN NURSE GETS DAMAGES IN NEW YORK

Miss Ida Newlands Recovers \$12,500 for Injuries Received in Fall Down Apartment House Elevator Shaft.

New York, May 28.—A jury in Judge Mack's formal notice of the federal court today awarded \$12,500 to Miss Ida Newlands, a nurse of Kingston, Ont., in her suit for \$50,000 against John W. Butler, a millionaire clubman living at the Ansonia. Mr. Butler is the owner of the Ansonia, an apartment house on Riverside Drive. On January 19th, 1912, Miss Newlands was attending a patient at the apartment house when she walked into the elevator shaft, the door having been left open. She fell to the basement and so injured her right arm that she will never be able to bend it.
