TOLEDO MUST GRAPPLE WITH  
DIFFICULT HOUSING PROBLEM

It is Estimated That 60,000 People Will be in That City to  
Witness the Fight Between Willard and Dempsey on  
July 4th—Hots Inadequate in Normal Times and What  
to do With the Visitors is a Big Question.

Toledo, O., June 22.—This city must  
grapple with a difficult housing prob-  
lem in preparing for the enormous  
crowd expected here to witness the  
heavyweight championship contest be-  
tween Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey,  
July 4. With a seating capacity  
estimated at about 60,000 in the arena,  
it is estimated that at least 60,000  
visitors will be in Toledo the day of  
the bout. Of these about one-third,  
or 20,000, are expected to be in the  
city over night.

Toledo itself is a city of about 300,  
000 population and even in normal  
times the hotel accommodations are  
inadequate. The city boasts of ele-  
ven hotels of 100 or more rooms ca-  
pacity and ten more of fifty rooms or  
better. The two biggest hotels have  
been "sold out" for the last six weeks.  
Nearly all the other hotels have  
reservations calling for their full ca-  
pacity. The smaller hotels are filling  
more slowly, but unquestionably will  
be occupied to capacity long before July 4.

All the hotels plan to install extra  
cots and beds in the rooms. A flat  
rate of \$5 a bed, whether there are  
two or half a dozen beds in each  
room, has been established as the min-  
imum. Only a few newspapermen,  
who have been on the scene a month  
or more, will be permitted to occupy  
rooms alone. Other guests will be  
obliged to share their rooms with  
as many persons as the management  
sees fit to provide beds for.

Estimates place the total bedding  
accommodations in the hotels at a  
discrepancy of 13,000 beds for the num-  
ber of persons expected to spend the  
night of July 3 in Toledo.

Ad Q. Thatcher, a Toledo sports-  
man, is the leader in the enterprise  
to provide sleeping accommodations  
for this crowd. "Thatcher and sev-  
eral associates have obtained leases  
on a number of vacant buildings in the  
downtown district and for the last  
month have been installing cots. The  
two largest of these buildings, the  
Terminal Building and a five story  
structure formerly occupied by To-  
ledo's largest department store, will  
provide room for 3,000 and 2,500 cots

respectively, while others probably  
will have room for another 2,000 beds.  
Thatcher and his associates are  
installing cots formerly used in army  
cantonnments. All bedding for the tem-  
porary sleeping accommodations is be-  
ing rented from Chicago, linen for 75,  
000 cots having been secured by the  
Toledans. Probably 10,000 beds will  
be ready by July 4, which leaves only  
1,000 "extra sets" for any emergen-  
cies which are bound to arise.

Lodging houses are preparing to do  
a land office business. Little more  
other American cities, Toledo has out-  
grown its housing accommodations in  
the last few years due to the great in-  
crease in growth and rooming quarters  
are none too plentiful even in normal  
times. Keepers of lodging houses are  
planning to double up their regular  
guests to make room for the expected  
influx of visitors.

Toledo is within a short train dis-  
tance of many large cities and hun-  
dreds of persons will stop over night  
in these cities, coming to Toledo only  
in time for the contest. Hundreds,  
perhaps thousands of persons will stay  
all night in Chicago, Detroit and Cleve-  
land, all within a few hours ride of To-  
ledo.

Pullman and steamer accommo-  
dations cannot be counted upon. The  
United States Railroad Adminis-  
tration has ruled that it cannot permit  
the boxing contest to interfere with  
train movements vital to the demobil-  
ization of returning troops and has at-  
tached cancelled permits for many spe-  
cial trains which had been planned  
for the contest. Persons who were  
planning on making the trip on these  
special trains will therefore have to  
come to Toledo before the bout and  
will add to the crowd of visitors here.

DOUGHBOY HELD  
FOR MURDER

Charged With Shooting Man  
and Woman in Neutral  
Zone Opposite American  
Area of Occupation.

Coblentz, Tuesday, June 24.—(By the  
Associated Press.)—Lieut. John Beggs,  
23rd Infantry, of Kansas City, is under  
arrest facing a charge of murder in  
connection with a shooting affair at  
Seeburg, a village in the neutral zone  
opposite the American area of occupa-  
tion. The German authorities claim  
that two Americans, a man and a woman,  
were killed.

PLOT TO MURDER  
SCHEIDEMANN

A Number of Soldiers Ar-  
rested at Weimar Involved  
in a Plan to Put Away  
Former Premier.

London, June 25.—A number of sol-  
diers have been arrested at Weimar,  
according to an Exchange Telegraph  
despatch from Copenhagen, on charges  
of having planned to arrest and  
murder Philipp Scheidemann, the for-  
mer premier. The plot was to have  
been carried out Monday evening.

WHAT'S TO BE DONE  
WITH VON REUTER?

He Alone Was Responsible  
for the Scuttling of the Ger-  
man Fleet.

London, June 25.—Reuter's learns  
that the authorities are communicat-  
ing with Paris regarding action to be  
taken against Admiral von Reuter,  
who, with officers and men of the Ger-  
man fleet, is interned. It is confirmed  
that the admiral has learned that the  
scuttling of the fleet was entirely  
the work of the German admiral, and  
was not carried out as a result of in-  
structions from Berlin.

IRISH WILL SEEK  
FINANCIAL AID  
FROM CANADA

Sinn Fein Leader Says They  
Have as Many Sympa-  
thizers Here as They Have  
in United States.

New York, June 25.—The activities  
of the Irish, in their campaign for in-  
dependence, will not be confined to the  
United States, but will be extended to  
Canada and Australia, Edmond de  
Valera, the Sinn Fein leader, an-  
nounced here today.

"We have sympathizers just as  
strong in Australia and Canada as we  
have here in the United States, and we  
will take a portion of the loan in those  
two countries," he said.

FRENCH POLITICS  
IN CHAOTIC STATE

Possible There May be a  
Shake-up in the Cabinet.  
Experts on Economics Be-  
ing Added.

Paris, June 25, (Havas).—The state-  
ment made by Premier Clemenceau  
in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday  
concerning the probable date for gen-  
eral elections is interpreted by a  
number of newspapers as meaning  
that the premier will not retire shortly  
as has been reported.

Several newspapers print reports  
that it is possible there may be a  
shake-up in the cabinet, and that spe-  
cialists in social and economic ques-  
tions will be brought in. The Echo  
de Paris says that, if changes are  
made in the cabinet, they will not oc-  
cur before the ratification of the peace  
treaty by parliament.

MUELLER REFUSES  
TO BE PARTY TO  
SIGNING TREATY

Berlin, June 25, via London.—Her-  
mann Mueller, the new Foreign Min-  
ister, the Taagebiel says, has declined  
to go to Versailles to sign the peace  
treaty. Field Marshal von Hindenburg,  
it is added, has resigned the chief com-  
mand of the army.
