TURKS WELCOME
TOURIST SHIPS
FROM AMERICA

Cheered by Compatriots and Muslims as They Arrive in Constantinople.

Constantinople, April 27.—Americans and Turks were delighted by the arrival here recently of two big American tourist ships carrying together more than 1,000 passengers, among whom there were said to be eighty millionaires.

Revival of the American tourist business had been awaited here with great anticipation and the Americans received more than a cordial welcome from their compatriots connected with the city as well as from the keepers of Turkish banquets anxious to sell souveniers.

One of the ships sailed into the harbor of Constantinople with its band playing "Dixie," while the Americans on the Near East Relief orphanage on the waterfront waved American flags.

The Americans found Constantinople harbor filled with the warships of every nation, a country still at war and a city with more than 150,000 refugees. Passengers of both ships took up collections for emergency relief, gave donations for orphanage and refugees and promised to send their wives and children to Constantinople when the trip was over.

The merchants were all excited over the arrival of the Americans and fairly pulled the tourists into their shops in their eagerness to sell.

Scenes of the city were framed in the windows of the American High Commission, and Mrs. Bristol in the Museum, a famous Russian restaurant. The American visitors were served by girls who were formerly members of the old Russian aristocratic families who came to Constantinople two years ago as refugees.

As a parting gift the tourists sent to the Near East Relief orphanage on the Bosphorus the favors given at the various dances.

MOONSHINE LIQUOR
SPREADS IN IRELAND

Traffic in "Potteen" Shows Rapid Growth in the Last Three Years.

Dublin, April 27.—The traffic of moonshine liquor in Ireland has assumed alarming proportions and threatens to imperil the standing of the British Isles as the most temperate of the group.

The traffic in illicit liquor or "potteen" is the result of the prohibition of the manufacture of spirits in Ireland, and its rapid growth during the last three years was confirmed by many of the bishops in their recent Lenten pastoral letters. Even the Dal Einninn, in spite of the many weighty political questions confronting it, has taken note of the situation and appointed a commission of inquiry to examine the causes which one bishop denounces as "gravely demoralizing the masses of the people."

Increased Powers
From Constitution

Egyptian Extremist Policy Would Sweep Away All British Influence from Their Country.

Alexandria, Egypt, April 27.—With the exception of provision being made for all the posts of Undersecretary of State at the several ministries being held by Egyptians and for the discontinuation of the presence of the Financial Adviser at cabinet meetings, no important changes have been made in the machinery of the Government since the ministry of Abdel Khalek Sarwat Pasha came into office on March 1 under the new regime.

With the executive control still in the hands of Anglo-Egyptian officials, the internal administration of the country continues in a normal fashion and without any disorganization. As the retirement of important English officials is imminent owing to the new policy of suppression of some of the highest posts in the administration of the country and the dissatisfaction which is felt at the prospect, the influence of the undersecretaries of state, mostly capable men, will strengthen during the coming summer, though owing to the insufficiency of qualified Egyptians and the requirements of the British policy referred to below, many English officials will remain, though generally speaking, inconspicuously.

The British policy will be maintained with but slight modifications, but the terms of the Curzon project in regard to the military forces of the country, especially as it affects the Sudan, and the external policy, but it is the sincere intention of the British Government to endow the Egyptian Government with as much internal independence as is possible, compatible with the maintenance of an efficient administration, which Great Britain is bound to secure for the protection of foreign interests and to avoid international complications.

The Egyptian Moderate policy is to attain complete internal independence as soon as it is feasible possible, with the retention of no English officials, unless through the lack of necessary qualifications on the part of the Egyptians or owing to British pressure.

Hope of the Moderates. Probably in order to remove any excuse for British interference in favor of foreign interests, the demand of the French and Italian colonies for the retention of capitulations without qualifications is welcomed. The Moderates hope to gain control of the external policy of Egypt in due course through gaining foreign confidence or by an expected change in circumstances, but pan-Islamic or other retrogressive influences are not particularly evident. The Egyptian extremist policy is to sweep away all British influence both internal and external and to employ technicians of their own choosing. Such a pan-Islamic policy suits the character of the masses, and taken into consideration with his despotic trait, explains the popular sympathy and support which is being exhibited toward Zaki Pasha.

However, the intelligentsia is too much imbued with western civilization, together with perhaps the smattering and growth of enlightenment of the fallacious and the appreciation of forty years of fair administration is too marked to permit of the reversion to feudalism. Further than this, economic considerations, apart from the British requirements render such a policy impracticable, all of which makes for the strengthening of the Moderates' position.

An important factor in the political situation of King Fouad, who is both clever and assertive. He will endeavor to obtain considerable powers under the constitutional law which is now under preparation. Judging from the character of the Egyptians, a democratic government is the only possible one if British influence is strongly apparent. It is evident that otherwise the sole means of the government at the present stage will be that of autocracy. As to personal interests, the immature opinions of Egyptian generally preclude the co-operation of the masses or of their representatives.

King Fouad, appreciating this state of affairs, is quite capable of seizing the opportunity of acquiring a pre-

dominating influence through strong Italian sympathies. As the nominee of Great Britain, however, the King would probably conform to the British policy, hence the reason for British support.

The date of the parliamentary election is still unfixed, but it is probable that they will be held before the autumn. The Ward Party is prohibited from holding clandestine meetings, as any opposition is considered obstructive. There is less political freedom under Sarwat Pasha than under the former regime. Meanwhile the status quo of Great Britain and Egypt will be maintained until the negotiations are opened with the National Assembly and also the ratification of the constitution.

HAD \$75,000 LOAD
IN SMUGGLED
CHINAMEN

Captain and Crew of Schooner Confess to Bringing in Twenty-Nine Saturday.

Tampa, April 27.—Twenty-nine Chinese are being hunted through Florida by Federal, city and county officials following the arrest here of Capt. Wm. Hood and five of the crew of the schooner Elita Mildred, who, according to officers, have confessed to bringing in these Chinese from Cuba for \$2,500 a head.

The Chinese were landed early Saturday morning, according to customs officers and disappeared before inspectors reached the schooner.

Fearing warning might reach the secreted invaders, officials threw out their net all over the state and withheld publicity until today, when thirty-six hours of guard on all avenues of escape had failed to bring results, indicating that the men still are hiding in this city. Capture is still a matter of time, the authorities say.

According to the alleged confessions, the Chinese were shipped at Cardenas. The smuggling schooner reached Egmont Bay Saturday morning, slipped by the pilot house and made her way to Hooker's Point, a mile south of the city, where automobiles signaled from the shore and waited for the Chinese to be rowed ashore.

Charged with driving the automobiles, Howard Thompson, Edna Atkinson and Jackson Palmer are being held. The three are from Boston. Thompson gave his address as 93 Summer street. He testified a week ago at a hearing following the shooting of two men on the steamship Cuba, arriving here from Havana.

The properties to be visited were the Midvale Steel and Ordnance Company, the Republic Iron & Steel Company, Lackawanna Steel Company, Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company, Inland Steel Company, Briar Steel Company and the Steel and Tube Company of America.

About 14 independent manufacturers whose companies represent an aggregate wealth of from \$800,000,000 to one billion dollars will be in the party which will return to New York in about ten days.
