Great Damage Along the Petitcodiac River---Wednesday

Moncton, May 10—(Special)—Much damage is reported to have been done to marshland and dykes along the Petiteodiac by the recent high tide. Opposite Moncton on the Albert county side the dykes are broken and miles of marsh have been flooded. Along Hall's Creek, forty or fifty feet of dyke, enclosing G. R. Jones marsh, has been carried away.

Wednesday night's tide is said to be the highest in three years. The wharves at Moncton were completely submerged and floors of sheds and buildings were flooded by two feet of water. The marshes in the vicinity of the city are inundated and quite a lot of damage has been done to hay land, besides necessitating rebuilding of the dykes.





CZAR, WITH GREAT POMP, OPENS PARLIAMENT

Pageant of Royal Family and Courtiers Without Parallel

Speech from the Throne Received in Sullen Silence by the People's Representatives---Message Was Short and Commonplace and Didn't Touch on Any of the Burning Questions Agitating Russia---Members, After Ceremony, Opened Session and With Difficulty Were Restrained from Passing Defiant Resolution.

St. Petersburg, May 10—Without a gan arriving at the Winter palace to single hitch and with only a minor accident to mar the memorable day, the Russian parliament was inaugurated today. The weather was superb, and the stage management of the impressive ceremony at tife Winter Palace where Emperor Nicholas, surrounded by courtiers and althe pomp and panoply of power, delivered the speech from the throne to the members of the two houses, was perfect. Such a spectacle, penhaps, never before has been witnessed on the earth's stage. The message in reality, was less a throne speech than a greeting, and required only three minutes for its delivery. Emperor Nicholas read slowly. The admirable and even cordial tone of the sovereign in renewing his pledges and asking the co-operation of parliament for the regeneration of the country was only negatively satisfactory. Courtiers and spectators other than members of the national parliament led the cheering, but the members were ominously silent, expressing neither approval nor disapproval.

What rankled most was the failure of the emperor, to mention annesty and later, when the members assembled in the Tauride palace, away from the spell of the throne room, many of them were with difficulty restrained from precipitating matters by offering resolutions on the subject. The constitutional Democratic leaders, however, who dominated everything, were anxious not to waken the reply which the lower house will prepare to the speech from the throne, in which she peech from the throne, in which she were for the emperor.
