A Petition of Terence Cochran was prefented by Markiarris, and read, praying payment of the fum of 581. 7s. expended by hous, as a Commissioner, in the year 1815, on the main road from the welt end of Ardoile Hill to the Half-way River at Horton, over and above the fum granted by the Province for that part of the faid road.

A petition of John Moody, James H. Tidmarsh and others, was prefented by Mr. Pryor, and read, fetting forth: that the petitioners have at a heavy expense, established in Halifax, a Manufactory for refining Sugar, and praying that a Drawback of the Provincial Duties on such imported Sugar as shall actually be manufactured by them into refined Sugar, may be allowed to them.

A petition of George Graffie & Co. was prefented by Mr. Mortimer and read, fetting forth : that the petiticners had in their Iron Cheft at the time of the Fire, on the 17th December laft, a quantity of Province Notes, which were confumed, and by which they fuftained a lofs of 1421, in faid Notes; and praying relief.

A petition of George Graffie & Co. was prefented by Mr. Mortimer, and read, fetting forth : that the petitioners fuftained a heavy loss by Fire, on the 17th December last, in Buildings and Merchandife, that a quantity of dutiable articles made a part of the Goods confumed by that unfortunate event, and on which there were paid or fecured to the amount of 7681. 198. 9d. and praying relief in the premifes.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the table.

On motion the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole House, on the further consideration of that part of His Excellency's Speech which relatesto the distress in many Districts of the Province from the failure of Crops.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Shaw took the Chair.

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the committee, that they had made further progrefs in the bulinefs to them referred, and that the committee had come to a Refolution thereupon, which they had directed him to report to the Houfe; and he read the fame in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

Refolved, That it is the opinion of this committee, that the Monies to be granted for the relief of those Perfons whole Crops have been deftroyed by Frost or otherwise, should be expended in purchasing, within this Province, Seed Grain; and by importing Barley, Rye, or Coarse Flour, to be distributed by the Legislature to the feveral Counties and Districts.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the committee to move for leave to fit again on the confideration of the business to them referred: which report the House agreed to. The
