TROUBLE IN AUSTRALIA.

Labor Problem Causes Anxiety
in Victoria.May Be Tied Up on State Owned
Railways.The Differences Between Govern-
ment and Their Employees.MELBOURNE, Victoria, May 8.—All
the state owned railroads of Victoria
may be tied up at 12 o'clock tonight,
in consequence of a serious dispute
between the government and the
railroad employees regarding the
right of the latter to affiliate
themselves with the Victoria
Trades Hall, the headquarters of
trade unionism in this colony.
The employees of the railroads are
practically civil servants and the gov-
ernment claims that in case of a strike
in other trades affiliated with the
Trades Hall, the railroad men would
be obliged to strike in sympathy and
therefore the government has notified
the railroad men that unless they
withdraw from the Trades Hall
before May 12, they will be
disbanded. The Engineers Associa-
tion replied that unless the govern-
ment withdraws its notification before
5 o'clock this evening they will strike
at midnight and leave their locomotives
wherever they happen to be. The
government has guaranteed double
wages for two months to non-strikers
and have notified the men that they
will lose their positions if they strike.

ANOTHER STRIKE.

Iron Workers Go Out at Toronto—Want
Recognition of Union.TORONTO, May 8.—The bridge struc-
tural and architectural iron workers
here have been unable to effect a settle-
ment with their employers and 120 men
have been ordered out on strike.
The concerns affected include the
Dominion Bridge Company, the
Queens Foundry Company. The em-
ployers agreed to grant the increase
asked for by the men, but objected to
recognition of the union. The demand
was for 35 cents an hour and eight
hours a day.

WHOLESALE ARRESTS

Of Bulgarians in Various Parts of the
Turkish Empire.LONDON, May 8.—The Sofia corre-
spondent of the Times says: The diffi-
culties regarding the tenor and con-
tents of the Turkish note are likely to
be arranged to the satisfaction of
both parties. The Sultan appearing
inclined to provoke a controversy.
Wholesale arrests of Bulgarians are re-
ported in all parts of European Turkey,
the Bulgarian schools in western
Macedonia have been closed and their
teachers have been arrested.
