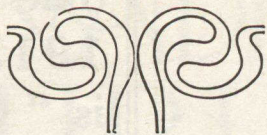

## Editor's Talk

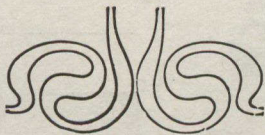

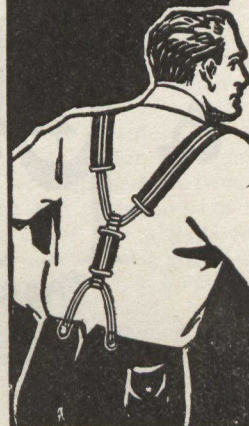
