Pressure on Stewart to lead Clansmen

Rob Stewart, at a height of six-feet-seven inches has always been a basketball big man, but now he is a

basketball BIG MAN.

A BIG MAN is not only tall, but is expected to do the majority of the rebounding at both ends of the court, score a lot of points and of course, intimidate the opposition with his solid play in plugging up the middle on

Stewart, of Portway Avenue in Mississauga, is the only senior starter on the Simon Fraser University basketball team and is carrying the big

load as the only really tall player the Clansmen can boast. Rob, a forward on Canada's national basketball team for the last two years has had to make the adjustment to the centre position this year while taking on the role as captain and team leader

both on and off the court. The Clansmen are only 6-7 in a disappointing year that has been injury-filled. "I'm playing well myself," Rob said yesterday in what is

obviously a bit of an understatement.

Stewart, who has never been a big scorer, is averaging 19 points a game for SFU and has picked off over 13

rebounds per game After beating five Canadian schools to start their schedule, the Clansmen have gone only 1-7 against American competition in NAIA play.

But Rob has averaged 24 points a game against the American teams and Saturday in a 77-67 defeat of Montana State, the Mississaugan drilled 34 points and wrestled down 19 rebounds in what he calls the best game of his

Stewart feels the experience he is gaining in the Canadian-American circuit will stand him in good stead when he returns to the national team. "I scored 24 points against a seven-foot centre we played from one of the

American schools," he notes. With two juniors, a freshman and a sophomore starting for the Clansmen, Rob knows that, "the pressure is completely on me."

He has to take care of the bulk of the rebounding, be the key man in Simon Fraser's help-out defence, score, and stay away from foul trouble since there is nobody of comparable size, or ability,

behind him. difficult for Rob who had to learn to the pivot position. "I can't shoot from

too far out or there's no one underneath to rebound if I miss," says Rob whose outside shooting is one of the strong points of his game.

Although Rob admits the Clansmen aren't likely to "go anywhere" this year he sees his role as keeping the players together by setting an example with his play both in games and in practice. "Everyone realizes, including me, that if I have a bad game we're in

Nonetheless, Rob relishes the chance to play almost all the time, gain valuable experience and grow more confident in his game.

Over the summer, Rob had an opportunity to play against one big man who he says made him feel like a dwarf. Wilt Chamberlain, who was vacationing in the Burnaby, B.C. area dropped by the SFU gym to work out. The two men played the shooting games that are one of the staples of basketball

"I never felt that small before," says Rob of the experience. "His arms were as big as my legs. He dwarfed me."

The games included one where baskets didn't count unless they were rimless. Wilt demonstrated his infamous ability to shoot the eye out of the basket in practice, but Stewart says he did manage to beat him "a couple of

When the SFU academic year ends, the fourth year student will be coming home to live in Mississauga and hopefully gain some weight on his 205-pound frame. He will also go on weight-lifting program.

But Rob may not be home all that The national team will Europe in May; play in the World Cup of Basketball which will see five games in Canadian cities in July and August: play in the World Student Games September; and then in the Pan American Games in Mexico. "Then it's only eight months to the Olympics, reminds Rob who says Canada will have an excellent chance at a haskethall medal

When Rob does go back to the national team it will again be in the mould of "mobile forward" who plays good defence and is active in the running, fast-break offence,

It will be a change from the more glamorous role of big shooter, big rebounder and key defensive man for Simon Fraser but the enthusiastic city contribution to the national team isn't


