His Excellency is desirous that they should be liberally remunerated for their labour and desires that you will either have the labour estimated by some disinterested person, and a distribution made according to the numbers of the labourers, or fix upon a reasonable daily allowance for each individual calculating the number of days employed. His Excellency requests that you, being on the spot, will use your discretion in arranging the matter in the way you may think most satisfactory to the Indians and transmit it to me for His approval.

Sir,

I received your ^{two} letters of the 28th & 29th Ult^o. this morning and shall hand the receipts for the Gun Powder to Major Patton Barrack master at this Post, the first opportunity.

I duly submitted your letter 29th to His Excellency who I am happy to say seemed much pleased to learn that you had been thus far successful in satisfying the Indians respecting your Presents. His Excellency is no less pleased with the prospect of a happy result attending the exertions of the Rev. Mr. Archbold, and Mr. Jones, and he has directed me to request that you will endeavour to afford Mr. Archbold every assistance in settling himself by making arrangements with Mr. Lewis for the construction of a House in any situation where Mr. Archbold may think most convenient.

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His Excellency has further directed me to say he has heard with regret that Mr. Phillips is in the habit of making too free with Liquor, and feeling how prejudicial such a failing in a teacher would be to the interests of his school, has requested me to desire you will report for His information whether, any rumour to this effect has reached you or whether there is any grounds for giving credit to it.

I send by this opportunity one hundred copies of a portion of the Gospel according to St. Matthew, translated in to the Indian Language, to be distributed as Mr. Archbold may think proper.

I am sorry to return the paylists you forwarded but you will perceive endorsed on one of them a Memorandum of the Dep^y Comptroller General, which obliged me to do so.
