THE KING AT LISBON.

His Majesty and King Carlos Warmly

Greeted.

Lisbon, April 3.—The British Royal yacht Victoria and Albert, with King Edward on board, arrived in the Tagus from Portsmouth, and was saluted by the warships and forts. The yacht steamed up the estuary, followed by the escorting British and Portuguese cruisers, and anchored opposite Black Horse Square, where an immense crowd had assembled. Every point, of advantage was packed with ecoole. Another royal salute was fired. people. Another royal salute was fired as King Carlos embarked at the Ar-senal on board the beautiful royal galley, which was built for the marriage of Dona Maria and Carlos IV. The warships manned sides and yards, and the sailors cheered as the State galley, followed by several others, proceeded to the Victoria and Albert. The interto the Victoria and Albert. The interview between their Majesties on board the Victoria and Albert lasted an hour and a half, after which a procession was formed and the two Kings went ashore. The historic galley, occupied by the Kings, led the way. It was followed by a flotilla of various craft. Their Majesties', progress was accompanied by jesties' progress was accompanied by salvos of artillery, and the sailors of the warships again manned sides. THE TARIFF ISSUE.

Senator Lodge Discusses Canada's Attitude.

Boston, Mass., April 3.—The following is an abstract of the speech of United States Senator Lodge of Massachusetts at the Home Market Club panquet at Boston to-night:-It is very evident that the Democratic party, in the failure of all their other issues. propose o fight the next national campaign upon the tariff and its allied nuestions. Under the soft and deceptive name of "tariff reform" of "tariff tive name of "tariff reform" of "tariff revision," they propose to renew their old attack upon the protective policy. Signs of their purpose abound on all sides, not the least significant being the pleasing recrudescence of Mr. Cleveland. A phase of the tariff question is Canadian reciprocity. A statement of facts will show that the Republican party, and the Republican party alone, has done all that has been done to bring about Canadian reciprocity, and has done all that has been done to bring about Canadian reciprocity, and that the failure of negotiations since 1888 has in every instance been due to the attitude of Canada. I hope that the commission, which is to meet again to consider our differences with Canada, will be able to make a reciprocity arrange-ment beneficial to both countries, but I do not propose to mislead anybody by painting bright visions of the prospainting bright visions of the pros-perity which is to pour in upon us un-der such a treaty. I was told this win-ter by a leading member of the Can-adian Parliament that Canada would never make a reduction on manufac-tured products, for she desired to con-tinue her preference to England; that

tinue her preference to England; that all Canada wanted was reciprocity in natural products.

In the Hay-Bond treaty the price which we pay to Newfoundland for the concessions which she is supposed to make to us is at the expense of a single industry. If we should get the entire value of all the Newfoundland imports it would not much more than cover the value of the fisheries of Gloucester, Mass., alone, and the value of the provalue of the fisheries of Gloucester, Mass., alone, and the value of the product of the fishermen of the United States is forty-six million dollars. We want to think carefully before we endanger an industry whose annual product is forty-six million dollars, in seeking a market where we now sell only two million dollars, and to which this treaty opens no additional door.




