

To pretend that drafters are the only class of profitable horses to raise is to go too far, just as it is not right to say that tractors or trucks are always the most

These are used to study problems of breeding, feeding, housing and management. They form, it is freely admitted by all, the largest and best stud of the breed in existence to-day. One of the points towards which efforts are concentrated in the production in a fairly consistent is the production in a fairly consistent manner, of a breed of horses weighing between 1,200 and 1,300 pounds, which may be used either on the road or on the plough, a low-set, thick animal, with a short back, a strong loin, giving him a general conformation which will make him a cheap producer of power.
