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J. J. B. FEANT WRITES AGAIN ABOUT PAVING

Claims That Trinidad Asphalt is Inferior to The Aztec or Mexican

Dear Sir,—The property owner upon Front and Bridge streets signed a petition for a pavement, believing they and the City of Belleville, would receive fair and just treatment at the hands of the council. The council, by a majority, decided to give the contract to the highest tender, thereby entailing a loss of about eight thousand dollars, to be suffered by the citizens.

When tenders are asked for work to be done, there is an implied understanding that the lowest tender will be accepted, provided that tender is reasonable, and comes up to the requirements of the specifications. Three tenders were lower than Foley & Gleeson, the lowest by Allen and Harvey. This lowest tender was put in by Mr. Allen, a valued citizen of Belleville, and Mr. Harvey, a well known and successful contractor. These gentlemen have done work for the Provincial and Dominion Governments, and cities and towns in Ontario. Mr. Allen is an engineer, and a gentleman who has had his capacity tested by the splendid work he has performed for the County of Hastings. He has also made a special study of concrete work, which will form a very large proportion of the work to be done, so that he is exceptionally well calculated for the work we wish to have performed. Allen & Harvey's tender was the only one that was submitted which fulfilled all of the specifications required.

Now the point taken by the majority of the council is the kind of asphalt to be used. Allen & Harvey's tender covered both Trinidad and Aztec brands of asphalt. Mr. Allen preferred the Aztec Mexican asphalt as being the purest and best, and to show the council how high it ranks as an asphalt, and to prevent any possible loss by its use, he offered to give a bond from the U.S. Asphalt Refining Co. of New York, guaranteeing to the City of Belleville that Aztec asphalt would outwear the Trinidad asphalt under similar conditions. While preferring the Aztec asphalt they specified their willingness to use the Trinidad or California asphalt if the council so desired. Under these circumstances it would strike any fair mind that with the additional guarantee which he offered to give, protecting the City in every way, that Allen and Harvey's tender should have been accepted. Messrs. Allen and Harvey also insisted on laying the asphaltic concrete wearing surface of the pavement.

Then, if for any cause, the council turned down the Allen & Harvey tender, which they do not accept the second tender, which covered the specifications? Why, did they ask for tenders for the second time, if their minds were made up to give the highest tenders the contract? The chairman of public works, dwells upon the excellence of Trinidad asphalt. I beg to present to your readers an extract from a work of the highest authority, copyrighted in 1913, styled "Asphalt and Highway Engineering," giving their statement regarding Trinidad Asphalt (or pitch) "The main deposit of this asphalt (or pitch) is found in the island of Trinidad, off the North Coast of South America. The lake of great expanse, between the main deposit and the sea, are other deposits, covered more or less, or mixed with soil. The pitch from the lake is known under the name of Trinidad pitch. Please note what follows—'The material forming this deposit is an emulsion of water, gas, bitumen, and mineral matter, the latter consisting largely of sand and a lesser amount of clay. As has been mentioned there are deposits of bitumen between the lake and the sea and the material taken therefrom is known as land pitch. It has been subjected to atmospheric wearing and by contact with the soil for years, as a result of which its physical properties are inferior to those by the lake deposit. The greater distance from the lake to which the land pitch is found, the more it shows signs of age, and weathering, and the more inferior it is.'"

In table No. 16 from "Mineral Resources of the United States for 1913" under the head of Trinidad, I find it stated as "Soft, mixed with much clay and water." "Impure mixture of soft asphalt water and clay, having somewhat the nature of petroleum emulsion."

This is the description of "Trinidad Lake Asphalt" as therein mentioned. I now give you the analysis of Trinidad Asphalt as found in the latest authority—

Crude Water and gas volatilized at 100 degrees centigrade ..... 23.0% Bitumen, soluble in cold Carbon disulphide ..... 89.0 Bitumen retained by mineral water ..... 0.3 Mineral matter ..... 27.2 Water of hydration in clay and silicates ..... 3.3

Does the City of Belleville want its streets paved with Trinidad Asphalt, a mixture of sand, clay and mineral matter, showing only 36% of bitumen in the crude Trinidad Lake Asphalt, and 5% bitumen in the refined product? What protection is there for the City of Belleville in the Foley

& Gleeson tender Trinidad Asphalt is to be used and the asphalt may be of the miserable land asphalt, and if it is not, THEN AT THE BEST FROM THE CENTER OF THE LAKE with only 56% of Bitumen in the refined product. Now, no wonder Allen and Harvey prefer to give the City the Aztec, in preference to the Trinidad, and were willing to back up the Aztec by the U. S. Asphalt Refining Co's guarantee bond.

Especially I feel that a great injustice has been done to Allen and Harvey, and the citizens of Belleville. The load of debt upon the city is very great, why waste eight thousand dollars of hard earned money? Feeling this I offered to guarantee the city that if the city would do the work specified under Mr. Allen's supervision, that the city would save \$9,000. In endeavoring to join the city and prevent the giving of the contract, I am doing so, in the interest of the citizens of Belleville, and because I think a great injustice has been perpetrated with regard to Messrs. Allen & Harvey.
