FIFTEEN HUNDRED

Most of These Are on Gallipoli Peninsula Where the Fighting Has Been of Desperate Character

London, Sept. 10-The officers casthe recent fighting in Gallipoli peninsula where the bulk of casualties are announced. They show the British army lost

407 officers killed, 959 wounded, and 136 missing for the fortnight. This number has been exceeded only once in any fortnight since the beginning of the war, 1627 casualties having been announced between May 5th and 18th. The losses of officers since the outbreak of hostilities have now reached a total of 15,840, of whom 4,790 were killed, 9,698 wounded, and 1,352 missing.

During the past fortnight Brig. Genrl. Baldwin was killed, three other Brigadier-Generals wounded, British Steamer nine Lieut.-Colonels killed, and two reported missing.

The Australian contingent has been the greatest sufferer, having lost 68 killed, 150 wounded and 15 missing.
