OUR BRITISH LETTER

New Cherries and Strawberries.

Owing to a succession of cold winds and hot spells the promise of a bumper fruit year in Kent has been dispelled. Trees which were laden with fruit are now comparatively bare. Plums and apples have been attacked by aphid wholesale. The first consignment of English cherries was sold at Covent Garden on Tuesday at an average of 9d. a pound, 5d. more than last year. Hampshire is providing an enormous yield of strawberries this year, and the first supplies were despatched to the London market on Tuesday. Warm sunshine is badly needed to improve the flavor.

Man's Eye Worth £60.

"I certainly shall not give a man less than 80 pounds for a lost eye. I have been here long enough to have a tabulated idea of the value of every limb and every part of a man's frame." Thus spoke Judge Mellor in a workman's compensation case at County Court on Monday. Harold Clarke, twenty-one, George-street, Moss Side claimed against Hyde's Queen Brewery, Ltd., of Moss-lane West.

His honor said he had many confident opinions from doctors, which had not been borne out, and until the eye had been removed he would rather not settle the case.

Dead Three Weeks in House.

It was stated by a doctor at the inquest at Sheffield on George Goodlad, aged forty-five, that death had occurred some three weeks before his body was found at the house. The discovery was due to the fear of neighbors that something might be amiss as they had not seen him since May 21. On Monday the coroner's office and a police sergeant visited the premises. They found the windows and doors barricaded, and when the back door was forced a large grinding stone and iron bar were behind it. The sum of 30 pounds was found in the man's pockets. The house was piled from floor to ceiling with cinders, newspapers, thirty old coats, and thirty or forty soiled shirts. The only piece of furniture was a 3-legged stool, and it is reported that Goodlad's only bed was a heap of ashes. Death was due to heart failure.

Constable's Race to Save Life.

Constable Stanistreet related at Sale on Tuesday how near he came to drowning in an attempt to rescue a domestic servant named Alice Hughes, aged twenty-four, of Sidney-street, Salford, from the canal near Brooklands Bridge. The officer said he saw the girl, who was employed at the Grove Hotel, New Brown-street Manchester, jump into the water. He was 200 yards away, but he raced to the spot jumped some railings, threw off his helmet and cape, and sprang into the water. Hughes struggled, and grasping him around the neck, held him under the water, and so exhausted him that he sank. Someone threw a rope to him, and the next he remembered was finding himself on the canal bank. When he charged Hughes with attempted suicide she replied, "I had a tiff with my mistress and left. I went on the canal bank, but don't remember jumping in." She also said she had had constant headaches lately, and had not been fit to go to her work. A remand was ordered.

Boy Drowned at Southend

Fishing from Southend pier on Tuesday, John Willi, fifteen, of Windsor Road, Westcliff, fell into the sea and was drowned.

Broadstairs Annexes a Parish

A Select Committee of the House of Lords agreed on Tuesday to a

proposal, under which the Broadstairs council would annex the whole of the parish of St. Peter's Extra, with the exception of a small portion on which the isolation hospital stood. The promoters would pay the council of the Thanet rural district council in opposing the Bill, a settlement having been arranged.

Father Dies on Wedding Eve

Mr. Dan Sutcliffe, town clerk of Todmorden and County Court Registrar, who began life as an office boy with Messrs. Eastwood, solicitors, died suddenly at the age of 70, on the eve of his daughter's wedding. The ceremony was postponed. Mr. Sutcliffe succeeded Mr. T. W. Eastwood as solicitor to the local board, twenty-six years ago, and followed on as Town Clerk when Todmorden was incorporated in 1896. He leaves a widow and ten children.

Motor 'Bus Company Repair Road

It was stated at a meeting of the Ongar rural council that owing to the refusal of the council to repair damage done by motor buses on their way to Hainault Forest to the road at Lambourne, the London General Omnibus Company had sent down sacks of stones and filled up holes themselves. The council decided to go no repairs.

Religious Worker and the Sabbath

Allegations of Sunday trading by religious workers were made at the meeting of the committee of the Oldham Grocers' Association. Mr. Jackson said he could instance one case where a Sunday school superintendent opened until one o'clock on Sunday. The chairman (Mr. A. Cocker) said he hoped he could verify his statement, and Mr. Jackson said he could do so.

Nurse's Costume Found in Ditch

A solution was found on Tuesday of the problem arising from the discovery in a ditch at Weston, near Bath, of clothing belonging to Miss Kate Carr, a nurse at the Bristol Royal Infirmary. Miss Carr left her work a few weeks ago on six months leave of absence to visit friends in Montreal, and arrived at Quebec on Tuesday on the Royal Edward. Some of Miss Carr's luggage was stolen at Avonmouth Dock, and it is believed that the things found in the ditch were thrown there by the thief.

Husband's Terrible Confession.

Robert Thompson, Clark, thirty-two, an engineer, was remanded at Manchester on Monday on charge of murdering his wife, Daisy Clark, on Saturday night in North Western-street Ardwick. The woman was found on the pavement with her head almost severed from her body, and on the way to the infirmary she succumbed to her injuries. Clark gave himself up to Police-Sergeant Pye within half an hour after the discovery, saying, "You had better take me in charge as I have killed my wife with this knife under some arches near by."

Docking a Terrier's Tail

Charles Gautier was fined 5s. and 8s. 6d. costs at West Hartlepool for cruelty to an Irish terrier. It was stated that he had admitted cutting off part of the dog's tail with a razor two months ago. Inspector Hughes, of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, said it was abominable cruelty to dock a full-sized dog like that. Usually it was done when the animals were puppies. Defendant said that he did it for the dog's benefit, and said that the tail cut was all right now. He was also fined 5s. and 7s. 6d. costs for keeping the dog without a license.

Britain's Fleet of Motor Boats

Mr. John Burns states that there are now licensed in the United Kingdom 320,119 motor vehicles. These are made up of 175,247 motor cars, 132,245 motor cycles and 12,627 heavy motor vehicles.
