The jury decided that while Mrs. Petch was suffering from tubercular trouble, her death seemed to have been hastened by treatment given her by Cobb. Cobb claimed to have had a vision from which he learned how to cure consumption and many were treated by him.

4 O'CLOCK EDITION

PETERBORO HAS BAD TRAGEDY TO-DAY

Building of Turnbull Company Crashes in Killing Several People.

Remains of Three Women and One Man Taken Out at Noon.

[Canadian Press Despatch] PETERBORO, Ont., Aug. 28.—With four dead bodies removed from the ruins up to noon and with at least two others expected to be still buried in the debris, Peterboro is to-day in a state of excitement, following one of the most devastating tragedies in the history of the city.

Weakened by the removal of the dividing wall between the J. C. Turnbull Company's millinery and drygoods store and the premises formerly occupied by Barries Limited, next door, thirty feet of the outside wall of the Turnbull building fell with a crash about 10 o'clock this morning, carrying down with it the workmen on the outside and the clerks and customers inside.

The bodies of three women, none of whom have been identified, had been taken out at noon as well as the body of one of the workmen, Cuffs by name, while Miss Dollie Sisson, a saleslady, was unaccounted for, and believed to be under the debris. Many were injured and removed in ambulances to the hospital or their homes.

The financial loss will be heavy and is now estimated at \$50,000.

The large majority of the seventy clerks employed were uninjured and made a panic rush for safety when the building went down. Immediately the firemen were called out and with large crowds of volunteers frantically searched the ruins for the dead and injured. Doctors and nurses waited to render what assistance they could.

PETERBORO, Ont., Aug. 28.—The large store at the corner of George and Simcoe streets at which alterations were being made for the J. C. Turnbull Company, has collapsed. Several clerks and workmen have been taken from the debris.

The Turnbull Company had between sixty and seventy clerks employed in their store, but the large majority escaped without injury. The wall separating the two stores on the ground floor had been removed and only those employees and customers on the second floor of the building when it collapsed were in danger.

So far no fatalities have been recorded. Gangs of men are removing the debris and the worst should be known by noon.

Four Bodies Found. The dead bodies of three unidentified women and the body of a man had just been taken from the ruins of a building.

Eight other injured persons have been sent to their homes or to the hospital.

The man, who was killed, Cuffs by name, was employed with the construction gang.

Miss Dollie Sisson, a clerk, cannot be accounted for and her cousin Eva A. Sisson, saleslady in the ready-to-wear department, is missing. It is believed that the death list will reach six at least.

The corner store had been vacated by Barries Limited, and alterations were in progress to add this property to the Turnbull Company's premises.

Stevenson, head of the Independent Order of Foresters, received cheer after cheer from two hundred and six delegates at the meeting of the Supreme Court yesterday afternoon.

At the close of the day, Mr. Stevenson went into the question of a home for friendless members of the order in a very extensive manner.

Mr. Stevenson will maintain the home out of his personal income, and at his death, two policies on his life will endow the home to the extent of \$100,000.

WHY THE INDIANS ARE DYING OFF

Inter-Marriage and Vile Tobacco Given as the Cause.

EDMONTON, Alb., Aug. 28.—That inter-marriage continued through generations, with the lack of nourishment of mothers at the time of child birth and the inordinate use of the vilest tobacco by women, are the three principal causes contributing to the enormous rate of infant mortality among the Indians of the north is the view taken by Gerald C. Card, Indian agent at Fort Simpson on the Great Slave River, who has just come out from his post, having spent about seven weeks traveling by scows and river steamers. Fort Simpson by the route travelled is about 1200 miles north of Edmonton.
