More Dining Room Capacity Needed at 'Y'

It is rumored around the Y.M.C.A. that the new building is to be en-
larged this summer. It is proposed
to extend the present building some
30 feet to the west, thus enlarging the
dining-room, the kitchen and the din-
ing-room of the men's club.
The original plans of the building
provided for an extension, and owing
to the capacity business which the
dining-room does at present it is
thought wise to make the extension.
With the new addition some sixteen
more bedrooms would be erected, and
at the present time the secretary has
a large number on his waiting list
for rooms.

It is only a matter of time until the
building will be enlarged, for at pre-
sent it is running to capacity, both in
the dormitories and in the dining-
room. A number of the men are
doubling up, and in 61 rooms at the
present time there are something over
75 men resident there. As many of
them as will stand for double room
are being pressed into taking a com-
panion, so as to create vacancies and
thereby find rooms for those on the
waiting list.
The Y.M.C.A. authorities will give
no statement regarding the pro-
posed enlargement of the building,
but it is safe to say that something
will be done in the near future.
