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FARMERS BANK BILL KILLED IN UPPER HOUSE

Vote 32 to 25 to Give the Measure a Six Months' Hoist.

OTTAWA, June 9.—The Farmers Bank depositors will not be recouped at present. The bill to aid them was killed in the Senate last night on a vote of 32 to 25, adopting the motion of Senator Power, of Halifax, for the six months hoist.

Party lines melted on both sides of the Senate when the Power amendment was put to the vote, 14 Liberals voting against the six months hoist and 11 Conservatives for it.

The 14 Liberals were: Mitchell, David, McHugh, Domville, Casgran, Bostock, Derbyshire, Develbar, Young, Watson, Ross, (Moosajaw), Ratz, Boyer and Talbot.

The 11 Conservatives who supported the six months hoist were: Bolduc, McKeen, Daniel, McKay, (Cape Breton), Ross, Corby, Murphy, Lariviere, Curry, Bowell and Monplaisir.

The Discussion
The discussion preceding the division was substantially along the same lines as that which took place on the bill in the House of Commons. It was urged by Senator Loughheed that the depositors of the ill-fated institution should be recouped as a matter of moral obligation on the part of the government having regard to the fact that the bank had started business on the strength of a certificate granted by the treasury board under the former ministry.

Several speakers on both sides of the House drew attention to the misery and suffering which followed in the wake of the disaster. The opposition to the bill was voiced by Liberal speakers only and was based upon the ground that the legislation opened the door to claims for compensation in regard to all other bank failures, past and future.

The defeat of the bill has caused keen disappointment among Ontario Conservative members of the House of Commons who have been brought into close touch with instances of ruin and hardship following upon the wreckage of the bank. The Senate vote was a surprise, despite the predictions of Liberals that the bill would be killed.

ANGRY AT MILITANTS.

LONDON, June 8.—Public anger in connection with the militant suffragettes outrages is expressed daily with more vehemence throughout Great Britain and reports from the provinces show that suffragette meetings organized yesterday were generally broke up and women threatened with violence. At Ilford, some miles east of London the speakers were pelted with tomatoes and other missiles; and an unsuccessful attempt was made by the crowd, under the leadership of a woman, to upset the women from which the suffragettes were speaking.

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FLANAGAN TO PARIS TO HANDLE JOHNSON

Will Again Take Charge of the Black Champion's Fistic Affairs.
Tom Flanagan left last night for New York, where he will sail for Paris to resume the management of Jack Johnson in the latter's battle with Frank Moran for the heavyweight championship of the world. The fight will take place late this month.
Flanagan will take charge of the final preparation of the champion, as in the bout with Jeffries at Reno. The local man was also with the black when he prepared for the meeting with Flynn in Las Vegas, N. H. Flanagan has been the friend and confidant of Johnson ever since the latter captured the title from Tommy Burns.

SHAMROCK'S TRIAL

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., June 8.—The wind was too boisterous to-day to take out Shamrock IV, challenger for the America's Cup, so instead of having her first race with the older Shamrock, she was docked to prove her measurement at the water-line. Should the weather prove fine to-morrow, the two boats are to be sent over a thirty miles course, and the challenger, according to American measurements must give the trial boat an allowance of four minutes, 23 seconds. In reference to the towing of the challenger across the Atlantic Sir Thomas Linton has decided not to ask for any favors.
