cause he is an honest man." Those in the court room soon began to see the interruptions increased which brought from the witness the heated exclamation: "I have the right to talk here, because they seek to keep a woman in prison."

This occasioned a clamorous uproar and Judge Albanel who hitherto has been impassive pounded his desk to restore order. "I will continue my deposition," then said M. Ceccaldi, and proceeded with a criticism of Premier Barthou's course in reading in the chamber of deputies the documents drawn up by Victor Babre in connection with the Rochette swindle.

When M. Ceccaldi had spoken for a hour former Premier Barthou was called to the stand and defended his action in making public the Victor Babre documents.

M. Caillaux also spoke briefly before Madame Gueydan appeared. Maitre Labori and Maitre Chenu then explained their ideas for and against the publication of the letters placed in Maitre Labori's charge by Madame Gueydan.

Maitre Chenu remarked that the letters did not concern the case, to which Maitre Labori retorted that he thought three of them did. Maitre Labori then returned the letters to Madame Gueydan and asked her what her wishes were in the matter, and she replied:

"I do not care what you do. Publish them all if you want to do so."

It was thereupon decided to place three of the letters among the papers in the case, but to read only one of them after the recess.

The question of the reading of the letters gave rise to another scene when the court reassembled. Judge Albanel, who had talked over the subject with the lawyers on both sides during the recess, recalled Mme. Gueydan to the stand, and Maitre Labori at once addressed her saying:

"These letters will not be read by me, Madame, do you wish them back?"

Mme. Gueydan: "No."

Maitre Labori: "Well, then, no one shall have them except myself. If you have heard of me being caught in a trap you are mistaken."

Maitre Labori appeared to regard Mme. Gueydan's seeming reluctance yesterday and her impulsive consent that he should have the letters as a device to place him in the position of either suppressing the letters or to reading them to the disadvantage of Madame Caillaux, he asked her again:

"Madame, do you wish to take back these letters?"

Madame Gueydan: "No, sir."

Maitre Chenu: "Give me the letters to read them up."

CHANCE FOR AGREEMENT

(Continued from Page 1)

According to The Liverpool Daily Post, one of the leading Liberal Newspapers, it is frankly acknowledged today that the effort made by the conference at Buckingham Palace to reconcile the conflicting views of the Irish Nationalists and the Ulster Unionists must be abandoned. The newspaper adds that the report of this unhappy result of the conference of the leaders of the Liberal, Conservative, Irish Nationalist and Ulster Unionist parties will be published in the court circular this evening.

The Buckingham Palace conference met again to-day and held the shortest of its four sessions. The meeting was called for 11 o'clock. The chairman, the Right Hon. James Lowther, Premier Asquith and Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd George, representing the Liberals, Andrew Bonar Law and the Marquis of Lansdowne of the regular Conservative opposition; Sir Edward Carson and Captain James Craig, Ulster Unionists; and John Dillon, Irish Nationalist, arrived at the palace at that hour, but the business of the session did not begin until half past eleven as John E. Redmond, through a misunderstanding, was half an hour late.

Discussion of the Ulster situation lasted only forty minutes and the members then left the palace. No statement of to-day's meeting but it was expected that Premier Asquith would make an announcement in the House of Commons in the course of to-day.

LONDON, July 24.—The feeling was general in the lobbies of the House of Commons that the Ulster conference had failed in its immediate purpose and that no definite agreement had been reached. Members awaited anxiously the announcement as to the actual situation to be made by Premier Asquith.

Except among the extreme Radicals and Labor members, who are opposed to a conference of any kind and think the matter should have been fought out on the floor of the House of Commons, it is felt in parliamentary circles that the meetings of the political leaders in Buckingham Palace have done much good. It was pointed out that they had shown how far the opposing parties were prepared to go and that this would assist the government in reframing its bill to amend the Irish Home Rule Bill.

Sir Edward Carson and his followers during the conference had, it was understood, abandoned their demand for the clean-cut of the Province of Ulster from the control of the Dublin Parliament and were prepared to accept the exclusion of six counties. The Nationalists on the other hand agreed to leave the four northeastern counties of Ulster out of the control of Dublin and to allow the counties of Tyrone and Fermanagh to take a vote on the question whether they should be included or not. Neither party, however, would consent to go a step farther.

The suggestion of the Right Hon. James Lowther, chairman of the conference that Tyrone and Fermanagh should remain out temporarily proved unacceptable to either party. A leading Liberal said to-day: "There is no reason to assume that

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 50 acres extra.
