Economic Value of Birds. The insects that destroy our fruit crops attack every portion of the tree and its fruit. The woolly aphis attacks the roots; the trunk and limbs are preyed upon by millions of plant lice, scale-insects and borers; the leaves are devastated by the all-devouring leaf-worms, canker-worms and tent-caterpillars, while the fruit itself is attacked by the curculia codling-moth and apple-maggot. By the annual expenditure of about \$8,000,ooo in cash in the spraying of appletrees, the destructiveness of the codling-moth and curculio have been greatly reduced; but of course that great sum must be set down as a total loss to the farmers and consumers in addition to a shrinkage of \$12,-000,000 in the annual crop from insect ravages that could not be pre-
