HOSPITAL AID HELD MEETING ON FRIDAY

Preparations Made for Election of Officers at Annual Meeting in January.

The December meeting of the Women's Hospital Aid was held on Friday morning in the Library, the president, Mrs. Waterous, presiding, with a good attendance.

The minutes were read and confirmed, and the Treasurer's statement given. Expenditures during the month were \$249.13. Balance on hand \$1,526.04. Mr. Hartman, of the Mutual Delivery Company, presented the auxiliary with a receipted bill for services rendered by them in collecting parcels for the rummage sale, and Mr. Young gave a donation of \$5 in connection with the purchase of a sewing machine for use at the hospital. These favors were gratefully received and votes of thanks tendered to the donors.

There were no accounts presented, but the treasurer was empowered to pay any outstanding bills.

A letter was read from the secretary of Brant Chapter, I. O. O. F., soliciting the patronage of the W.H.A. members at the patriotic teas to be given by them this week and next. Reference was also made to the coming concert given under the auspices of the officers of the 84th, for a similar purpose.

Mrs. Hurley announced that an invitation had been extended to the ladies of the auxiliary to visit the "Pleasant Women's Institute meeting on the 7th.

On motion, Mesdames Nelles, Digby, Schell, Cockshutt and Henwood were appointed a nominating committee, with Mrs. Nelles as convener.

It was decided that each member be asked through the press to send in the names of the nominating committee, 1st and 2nd vice-president, secretary and treasurer, at least one week before the annual meeting which will be held on January 14th, 1916.

Miss Forde, being present, was asked about Christmas at the hospital and other matters.

It was resolved that a sum of money be set aside for any extras that may be needed for Christmas, and that all provisions be provided in ice cream and holiday decorations.

Re. ambulance linen and other supplies needed, it was stated that there should be at least 1 dozen sheets, 1 dozen pairs pillows, 1 extra pair blankets, 2 new pillows, etc.

On motion it was resolved that the W. H. A. will provide these necessities for the ambulance, sufficient for the present need.

The purchase of a web of blue and white flannellette for use at the hospital was approved.

It was resolved that any business that may arise during the holiday season, be left in the hands of the executive. The meeting was then adjourned.

MR. WOODSIDE ADDRESSED SONS OF SCOTLAND

Annual Divine Service Held Last Evening in Zion Presbyterian Church.

Speaker Delivered Fine Sermon on "At the Shrine of Ancestry."

That Scotchmen as a race possess a patriotic spirit, an inquiring mind and a soul sensitive to religion were points emphasized by the Rev. G. A. Woodside of Zion church in his sermon to the Sons of Scotland, The members of the order occupy the centre down-stairs portion of the building, and a large-sized crowd was present to hear the sermon.

Mr. Woodside based his address on II Kings 2: 13, the story of the man's fall in falling on Elijah. To-night we were standing at the shrine of our ancestors, said the speaker, and the question was, were they worth emulating. He thought they were. Scotchmen had been born amid thrilling conditions, and a moral purpose had been behind all Scottish struggles. It was that moral complement in the past that had given Scotland her history, her heroes and her character.

The Scottish people possessed an inquiring mind. Their educational system was sown 250 years ago. The home had been their great centre of learning. A president of a great university had said Scottish people were more apt to get on because they had knowledge of the Bible, of Foxe's Book of Martyrs, of Bunyan's Pilgrim's Progress, and the Shorter Catechism. This gave them knowledge of the finest in literature and religion, and the knowledge of political elements which saved or which killed a nation.

The Scottish soul was sensitive to religion, affirmed the speaker. Religion is an element in one's nature that embraces every thing. Knox was not only a religious man, but a great statesman. Scotland's roll of honor, Robert Moffat, David Livingston, etc., were men who based their work on religion. In conclusion, in an eloquent oration, Mr. Woodside charged the Sons of Scotland to be worthy of the mantle falling upon them from the past, and to be faithful in keeping the will of God.

Special music rendered by the choir. Miss M. Taylor took the solo part in the anthem, "Lead Kindly Light," with the Misses Campion, Angus and Senn, rendered delightfully the "Saviour, Again to Thy Dear Name." The chimes effect on the organ as played by Mr. D. L. Wright, were very beautiful, although the performance was slightly marred by the organ being slightly out of order.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHERN LAND REGULATIONS. THE sole head of a family, or over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (Sub Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence on the land in each year. A homesteader may have five acres of his homestead made into a habitable house in required condition. Residence is performed in the vicinity of the homestead. A homesteader may, if he has a good standing, buy, pre-empt, or section alongside his homestead \$200 per acre. Duties—Six months' residence in three years after earning homestead entry; also 20 acres extra cultivated. Emption patent may be obtained as homestead section on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his right may take a purchase section in certain districts. Pre-empt acre. Duties—Must reside six months of three years on the land. Must erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to the condition of rough scrubby land. Live stock may be grazed on the land under certain conditions. W. W.
