### MUST OBEY LAW

A warning to all drivers of automobiles and motor vehicles was issued this morning by Chief Constable Chas. Slennin, regarding the breach of the Motor Vehicles Act. The chief stated that it must be distinctly understood that all owners of automobiles must observe the act and obey the policemen conducting the traffic. For the safety of the general public this act will be vigorously

enforced in the future, and all violations of it will be severely punished.

### SALE OF MILK.

The Whyte Packing Company of Brockville, who are desirous of obtaining information regarding the conditions prevailing here in the retail sale of milk, have communicated with City Clerk H. F. Leonard, requesting him to supply them with the required particulars.

They state that in Brockville, the milk is purchased on a quality basis, farmers being paid 50c per pound butter fat, or from \$35 to \$42 per ton. The following information is also volunteered in reference to the retail cost of milk there:

## MAYOR BOWLBY

In a Letter to the Daily Courier.

Regarding the Market Gives His Side of the Case Square.

Editor Courier:

Dear Sir,—The Council of the Corporation of the City of Brantford have passed a by-law to prevent forestalling the market by shop keepers and hucksters which does not follow out to my mind the very important clauses of the original by-law which worked so well and was repealed in 1907, to bring the producer and consumer together, thereby eliminating the profits of the shop keepers and middle men to the great advantage of all persons who do not desire to pay exorbitant prices for market products.

The by-law passed puts forward the hour to ten instead of eleven. Everyone knows that most of the marketing is done from 9 to 10.30. Therefore, why change the hour from 11 a.m.

It also omitted a part of the clause which the council voted down and was as follows: "That no person or persons shall sell, or offer for sale any vegetables, poultry, eggs, butter, cheese, fruit, fresh fish, hay, straw, oats or live animals, within the city of Brantford, at any place but the public market, except in shops, nor without having first paid the market fees thereon."

"That no person or persons shall buy, forestall or engross any provisions, food or produce in the said city on which the market fees are hereby required to be paid, or to go to meet any person, within the city of Brantford bringing any of the aforesaid articles to market, for the purpose of buying, or proposing to buy, or to import any such article for the purpose of reselling the same or any part thereof until after the hour of 11 o'clock."

Any one with the least intelligence can comprehend the meaning of the above.

It would appear to be a case of "How not to do it." It will be observed that the clause the sons of the council would not include in the by-law was in the last degree important. As their by-law stands there is nothing to prevent any shop keeper or huckster, at any of the street corners coming into the market or anywhere upon the public streets, forestalling the market, as much as they like. It was objected that the shop keeper was prevented from buying directly from the farmer when coming to the city, not to go to the market, but to sell in quantity to the shop keeper. At least, I thought he had no such meaning, or effect was not in restraint of trade as the shop keeper in his shop was not restrained from purchasing from the farmer when coming to the city to sell to him direct. It only prevented the shop keeper from stopping the farmer on the road to the market with his products and diverting him to his shop.

If it is good to stop forestalling on the market, it is equally good to stop it on the streets.

Again it was contended that the working man would be injured because the farmer could not deliver butter to him. That again is not true, as under the original by-law any person could bargain with a farmer to deliver butter and would not infringe the original by-law. It is wonderful how some people's bowels of compassion open to the poor working man. If I may be permitted to judge, I would say that these same working men are not so easily fooled as some people think.

I felt it to be my duty to make the situation plain to the public, as I have earnestly sought to have a real market in Brantford and not a delusion and a sham.

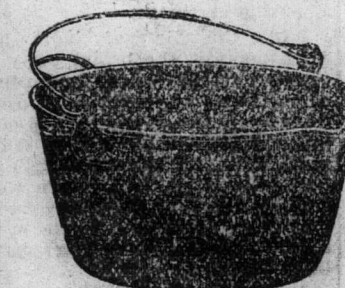

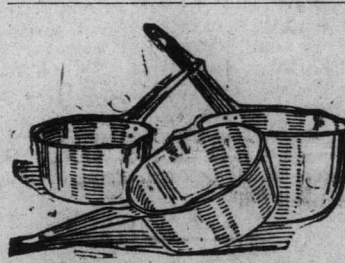
