ENORMOUS LOSS THROUGH KEEP ING POOR DAIRY STOCK.

Chatham, Ont.

"Good judges believe that in the United States one-third of the cows kept for their milk do not pay for their cost of keeping, and nearly third more fail to yield annual profit. This rather startling statement was, says a United States agricultural bulletin, "made in the Year Book of the Department of Agriculture for the United States about five years ago by one who is competent to speak upon the question. It is possible that in the meantime the condition of the dairy stock has improved somewhat but the writings of the experiment stations and the continual agitation of the subject which is kept up by the agricultural press do not indicate that there has been any very widespread improvement. The general proposition is true beyond dispute that a considerable proportion of the dairy cows of the country are kept either at an actual loss or so small a profit- as to give very little net return." The number of milch cows in the United States is about 16,000,000. Assuming that 5,000,000 of these cost \$2 per head above their keep the annual loss in \$10,000,000. If to this is added the \$15 per head that they should earn over the cost of maintenance, the total loss is \$85,000,000 a year.

Chancellorsville, May 1st to 4th, 1863-Union oss, 16,000; Confederate loss 12,281. Wilderness, May 5th, to 7th, 1864-Union loss, 37,737; Confederate loss, 11,400. Spottsylvania Courthouse, May 8th to 18th, 1864-Union loss, 26,461; Confederate loss, 9,000. Of the aggregate of 129,838, the Union loss was 92,581, while the Confederates lost 37,257. In the National Cemetery on Mary's Heights, the nation, there lie buried 16,500 Union soldiers. 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
