## HOPE FOR CANDIDATES

Toronto, August 7.—Relative to the report that some 60 per cent. of the candidates at the recent departmental examinations had been unsuccessful, it is learned officially that the Education Department, through the examiners, will make special allowances in certain papers.

Dr. John Seath, superintendent of Education, showed that the Department had power under the Act to alter the standard required on any given paper, and continued: "No injustice will be done any candidate. Where it is deemed that the case comes under the section alluded to, it will be availed of by the examiners."

Registrar Houston said the question of special allowance was being considered, and due allowance would be made where the paper was deemed to be too difficult for the students.

Mr. Houston pointed out that, after all, it was not the difficulty or unfairness of the papers that had caused the slump, but the fact that they dealt with branches of the work with which the candidates were apparently unfamiliar.

"This is quite evident in papers where three-quarters of the candidates fail," said Mr. Houston "and in all such cases special consideration is always given."

It is understood that the "plucking" papers were physics, ancient history and English.
