THE MAPLE LEAF.

First Worn as an Emblem by Native Canadians in 1860.

The fifth volume of the papers and records of the Ontario Historical Society, just issued, contains an unusually interesting series of papers contributed from time to time to the transactions of the association. The most interesting of the documents published in this issue of the records is The Globe's report of a public meeting held in the St. Lawrence Hall on the twenty-first of August, 1860, "to take measures with a view to native Canadians taking part with distinctive badges in the procession on the occasion of the arrival in Toronto of the Prince of Wales," now King, Edward VII. The meeting was well attended, and among those present were many prominent citizens, including the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Mr. David Reesor, Col. Denison, Mr. W. H. Boulton, Mr. J. H. Morris, and Dr. Richardson, who still survives. Several resolutions were adopted with a view to occupying in a systematic and creditable way the place assigned to "native Canadians" by the program committee and one of them asked that "all joining the procession should wear the maple leaf as an emblem of the land of their birth." This request was very generally complied with, not merely in Toronto, but wherever the Prince subsequently traveled in Canada.

It is interesting to note that some exception was taken to the inclusion of only "native" Canadians in the invitation, but Mr. Morris was ready with an admirable defence. The Prince was coming to this country on the invitation of the "Canadian" Legislature, and he should be able, on his return to his native land, to say that he had seen "Canadians." This he could not do if the people turned out "in one uniform mass without banners to distinguish those who were born in Canada from those who were not. The three national societies and other societies not of Canadian origin will occupy in great numbers the position on the day of the Prince's arrival, showing that they are English, Irish, or Scotch, or of such descent; in other words, that they are not 'Canadians'; we walk in the same procession in a separate body to show that we are 'Canadians,' and not that we are 'British' or 'Isles less,' but 'Canadians' more.

This step will lay the foundation of a nationality and give to the inhabitants of 'Canada' a distinguishing name. It is needless to call attention here to the manner in which the nation of forty-two years ago, has come true. Mr. Morris, who was a man of high culture and of exceptional precision of speech, knew exactly what he meant by "nationality," and few Canadians, especially those who are "native and to the manner born," will have any difficulty in understanding him. Nor is it necessary to say much about the effective way in which Mr. Alexander Muir's stirring lyric, "The Maple Leaf Forever," has been the means of diffusing and intensifying Canadian national sentiment.

Newfoundland's Trade.

In view of the probability of Newfoundland becoming a Province of the Dominion, its trade statistics will be of interest to Canadian manufacturers. The latest figures at hand are those for the fiscal year 1902. In that year Newfoundland's total foreign trade amounted to \$17,889,209 as compared with a trade of \$10,415,796 for the fiscal year 1898, an increase of over 66 per cent. in four years. The imports were valued at \$5,188,863 in 1898 and at \$7,836,685 in 1902, an increase of over 51 per cent., while the exports were valued at \$5,226,938 in 1898 and at \$9,553,324 in 1902, an increase of over 82 per cent. in four years. In 1898 the exports exceeded the imports by \$88,070; in 1902 the exports exceeded the imports by \$1,615,899.



THE MULTICOLORED STAR.

How to Make and Operate This Interesting Toy.

The multicolored star producer is an arrangement that any boy or girl can make and is a toy that is decidedly interesting. This is how to make it:

Fold a large, square piece of pliable cardboard in the center, like the cover of a book. In the center of this folded cardboard punch a hole with a strong pin, insert the point of a compass and draw a circle on the front and back of the folded paper three inches in diameter. In each of these two circles draw a triangle—one with the point upward, the other with the point downward. Cut these triangles out with a sharp knife. Open the cardboard almost flat and stand it upright on the table a

short distance from a white wall or a large sheet of white paper. Place two candles in such a way that the two shadows of the two stars cover one another. This is done by moving the candlesticks sideways, or if the candles stand too low, by putting books underneath the sticks. If you hold a glass containing a solution of red ink and water or green paint and water or a colored tissue paper spanned over a wooden frame between the flame of the candle and one of the triangles the star on the white wall or white sheet of paper will appear in three colors—the center white, while the points show the color of the fluid or the tissue paper and their supplementary colors. For red the supplementary color is light green; for green it is red, and for yellow it is violet.

A FUNNY GAME.

Seeing the Full Moon Often Fools the Little Girls.

Here is a funny game to play: Stand facing a girl and say to her, "You can't make the same motions I am going to make."

"Then she will say, 'Just see if I can't.'"
