Ottawa, Oct. 4 .-- The Supreme Cour endered judgment yesterday in si-election cases that had been heard be election cases that had been heard be-fore it last term, and in the appeal arising out of the collision in the St. Lawrence River at Sorel last season between the Richelieu & Ontario Navi-gation Co.'s liner Canada and the S. S. Cane Breton

Cape Breton.

In the Wentworth Federal election case, where the seat was claimed by both candidates, Smith and Sealey, the Supreme Court dismissed Mr. Sealey's appeal with costs, and directs that the order declaring the election void is to order declaring the election void is to stand, Sedgewick and Idington dissent-

ing.
In the King case, which involved the validity of Sir Frederick Borden's election, the petition against Sir Frederick is dismissed, which confirms him in his

In the Queen's-Shelburne case the preliminary objections raised on behalf of Hon. W. S. Fielding, the sitting member, were dismissed, and the Su-

member, were dismissed, and the Supreme Court sends the case back to the lower court for the trial of the petition against the Finance Minister. In the Cumberland, North Cape Breton and Pictou election cases the appeal is allowed with costs as to the tenth preliminary objection and the cases remitted to the lower courts to have evidence taken under this objection.

Judgment in the Cape Breton-Canada case goes against the Richelieu &
Ontario Co., the court holding that the
steamer Canada was alone to blame
for the collision in question. The case
is remitted to the Exchequer Court,
Quebec Admiralty district, for the aszessment of the damages to be paid
by the Richelieu & Ontario Co, to the
owners of the Cape Breton.

P.)—The report of the directors of the Grand Trunk Rallway shows that the gross receipts for the half year ended June 30 were £2,729,007, as compared with £2,559,316 in the corresponding period of last year The net traffic receipts were £805,570, compared with £663,747. With additions from other sources, the net revenue is brought up to £907,633. Deducting interest on debenture stocks and bonds, there remains a surplus of £285,033, which is increased by the amount brought forward to £251,652, from which the directors recommend the dividends already announced, leaving £7,423 to be carried forward.

The passengers carried were 4,303,765 for the half year, an increase of 345,951.

The Grand Trunk western gross re The Grand Trunk western gross recepits for the half year amounted to £512,995, against £506,147 in 1904. The working expenses were £429,438, against £432,874, leaving a net profit amounting to £83,557, against £73,-

The net revenue balance at the 30th of June amounts to £3,433, which will admit of the payment of 1 per cent, or the second mortgage income bonds.
