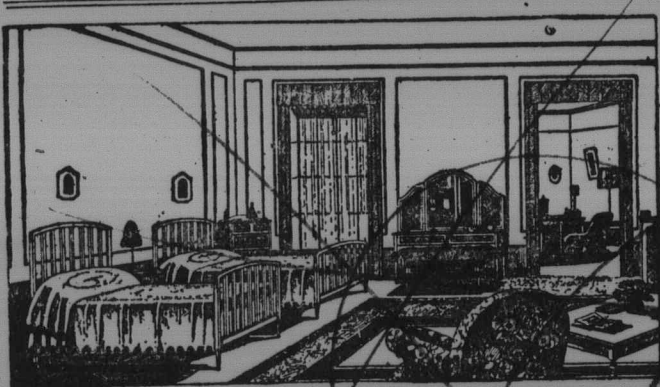

## OPENING OF NEW SCHOOL HOUSE

Hartland is to be Congratulated on its  
Fine New Building

Yesterday was a day to be remembered in the history of Hartland. It not only marked the re-opening of the schools, but it marked the "Opening of the New School House."

It certainly was with feelings of pride and pleasure that the pupils and a good many parents and the staff of teachers, numbering seven, with the trustees and officers of the school board gathered in the fine assembly hall for a formal opening before the different classes went to their own rooms. Short talks to the pupils were given by the trustees and R. B. Hagerman telling them that this fine new building was built for them and that they must take pride in keeping it in good condition and not to heedlessly mar it in any way.

The same staff of teachers with the exception of one are re-engaged—Kilburn K. Smith filling the vacancy caused by Miss M. Palmer's resignation. They are as follows: Grade I, Mrs. E. W. Laskey; Grade II, Mrs. W. B. Nixon; Grade III and part of IV, Miss Annie Kingston; Part of Grade IV and Grade V, Mrs. Edith Mills; Grade VI and part of Grade VII, Kilburn K. Smith; Part of Grade VII, Miss Mary Pringle; Grades IX, X and XI are in charge of Principal Harris Chapman.

The town is to be congratulated on again having this fine staff of teachers in the school and in having them for citizens during the school term. While Miss Palmer's absence is to be regretted there is no doubt but what her place will be ably filled by Mr. Smith.

The new building is built of brick and has two storeys beside a large basement. It contains a fine large assembly room with a spacious platform, and eight class rooms, two office rooms, beside cloak rooms, on the two main floors. In the basement there are two rooms finished which can be used as class rooms should occasion demand, which now can be used for recreation purposes. Two large rooms in the basement are used for lavatory and toilet rooms and are fitted up in the most sanitary modern style.

The furnace room is complete with its system of heating apparatus and there are sufficient fuel rooms fitted with fireproof doors. The whole building is fireproof and is fitted with an allotment of hose and fire extinguishers. There is a complete electric bell system, which can be operated from the principal's room as well as from each individual room. The building is wired for electric lights of course, but as yet the fixtures are not installed. Most of the cloak rooms have open metal partitions which make the corridors seem more spacious and are more airy. The newest style of drinking fountains are on both floors. The windows have transoms over them which will make winter ventilation perfect without there being drafts. The windows are also fitted with blinds. The building stands on a large lot of ground giving spacious playground room and is situated on what is known as Burr's flat and on the corner enclosed by Hillcrest avenue and Rockland road.

The plans were furnished by McPherson & Green of Hartland and Woodstock and these young men are to be congratulated on being able to furnish plans for such a fine building. Henry Post and H. H. Smalley were the contractors for the erection of the building. Frank Seeley had charge of the electric wiring. J. W. Montgomery had the plumbing and heating contract. Guy McGhiey had the contract for the painting and varnishing. Wm. McPherson was the inspector of the work.

## TERRIBLE MOTOR ACCIDENT AT PEEL

Auto Goes Over Bank at Peel and Results in Sudden Death of Woodstock Young Woman

The very worst automobile accident that has ever occurred in this vicinity was that which took place on Friday night. The scene of the accident was at the first railway crossing this side of Peel station, four miles above Hartland, and resulted in the death of Mrs. Olga Hayden Watson, a Woodstock lady, 29 years of age.

In the afternoon in company with Mrs. Aubrey S. Hood she left town for an auto drive going north on the western side of the river and crossed the bridge at Hartland, their destination, it is understood, being Perth. The accident occurred on their return trip at about 8:30 p.m.

It is said that as they approached this particular crossing (which is, by the way, a very dangerous one) Mrs. Watson remarked to her companion to keep a look out for cars. She went over the crossing and that is the last thing Mrs. Hood can remember. In making the turn evidently the rear of the car swung over the deep bank in that neighborhood and overturned. Mrs. Hood was thrown further down the bank than was the deceased, but managed to reach the top. Word was got to Hartland of the accident and promptly sent to Woodstock. Rankin went from there and reached the spot, 15 miles away, in 22 minutes.

Dr. McIntosh, of Hartland was already there. Dr. Rankin placed the injured woman in his car, but she died as the car reached Upper Woodstock. There was a bad cut over her left ear, the skull was fractured, her ribs were broken and there was a deep cut in her side. Mrs. Hood was unconscious for a time, but, although badly shaken up, she is not seriously injured.

In making the trip to Hartland Dr. Rankin was accompanied in his own car by Fred Moore, who drove it, and Ira McAfee. The car struck a deer, just below Hartland, and they stopped to remove it from the road, thinking it was dead, but it jumped up and started away on three legs. If this deer had been a cow, doubtless the doctor and his companions would have been killed owing to the speed the car was travelling.

The car which the deceased was driving was a new McLaughlin roadster owned by Ira McAfee. It was badly damaged. The wind shield, the steering rods, the top, the lights and one wheel will have to be replaced.

The deceased is survived by one daughter, Mary, aged eight years, her mother, Mrs. J. A. Hayden, two sisters, Mrs. A. D. Nicholson and Miss Gertrude Hayden and the following brothers: Halley, Ralph, Willard, Clarence, Douglas, Walter, Charles and Kenneth Hayden.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon, conducted by Rev. J. T. Cavers, with burial in the Methodist cemetery.
