I presented to their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, through His Excellency the Governor General, an invitation to visit this city during their tour of the Dominion. His Excellency's reply held out some hope that Fredericton would be honored with a Royal visit but recent announcements in the press force me to conclude that our citzens are not to have the opportunity of doing honor to the heir apparent to the throne. Our older citizens recall with great pleasure the visit of His Majesty King Edward to Fredericton in the year 1860, and they were looking for ward with the most pleasant anticipations to having among them, for a few hours at least, their future King.

IN A PITIABLE PLICHT.

Wreck of Steamer With Large Party of Fishermen on Board.

Gallant Attempt of Men to Save Their Families,

Several Lives Lostin the Terrible Gale

-Rescued After Much Suffering. ST. JOHNS, Nfid., June 13.—The schooner Czar, bound from Labrador with fishermen and their families, seventy people in all, was driven ashore on Cabot Island, on the north coast of Newfoundland, in a dense fog ashore on Cabot Island, on the north coast of Newfoundland, in a dense fog on Sunday night. A desperate struggle with the elements ensued, the mentrying to save the women and children in the teeth of a gale. The latter were finally saved, but four men were drowned and six others were injured in the undertaking. The survivors were on the island two days without food or shelter. Then another vessel, passing toward Labrador, sighted the distress signals, rescued them and landed them on the mainland, whence they will return home on board a mail steamer. The Czar became a total wreck and those on board of her lost all their belongings. The women and children were in a pitiable plight when they reached the island, being aroused at midnight and not being able to secure scarcely any of their clothing.

This bridge will be of one riveted truss span 52 feet in length and an approximate metal weight of \$10,300.
