## Washington Letter.

(From our regular correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7, 1888. - The chanes now are that the bone of contention between the two Houses-the heavy orfrom the Army Appropriation to the Fortification bill, where it properly belongs, and a pure and simple Army Apropriation bill be allowed to pass .-Members of the Senate Appropriation. Committee desire, however, to have some assurance from members of the other Appropriation Committee who are

likely to be on the conference committee that they will accept the Fortification bill in its present shape or with reasonable modifications before yielding from the Senate amendments to the Army bill .--Those who have surveyed the situation. believe that such assurances will be received from the House conferrees. It is highly probable now that a Fortification bill will be passed, and, while no cloubt changed considerably from its present shape, the one important feature which has provoked so much discussion-the appointment of an Ordinance Board to control the appropriations made-is likely to remain.
