Endeavoring to Prove His Sanity and Right to Complete Freedom—Mrs. Thaw Will Testify

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Monday.—Harry K. Thaw's fight for liberty was continued in the supreme court here to-day. Thaw is now endeavoring to prove his sanity and right to complete freedom. The proceedings which began to-day were based on a writ of habeas corpus taken out at the instance of the prisoner to procure his release from the asylum. I. C. R. TELEGRAPHERS GRANTED INCREASE IN WAGES ASKED FOR

A satisfactory arrangement was reached on all matters previously upsetting them. The amount granted towards increase of salaries will amount to almost ten per cent, which will be apportioned to the different positions as increase of work and other conditions since the last increase warrent. The increase will to a certain extent also apply to train dispatchers and their operators. The committee will hold a conference this week with D. Pottinger, General Manager. They were much pleased with the final result of their trip to Ottawa.

DISCOVERED HUGE PLOT TO KILL THE EUROPEANS

Calcutta Police Making Thorough Investigation, Convinced of Seriousness of Movement

The authorities believe they are facing an attempt at revolution. A number of prominent Bengalees are implicated and sensational arrests are expected to follow.
