BIG DAY FOR HYDROBODIALS  
Crystal Beach, Bridgeburg and  
Ridgeway Plan Celebration

BRIDGEBURG, June 14.—The Cris-  
tal Beach, Bridgeburg and Ridgeway  
Boards of Trade have arranged for one  
of the biggest demonstrations ever  
held, which will take place at Crystal  
Beach, the nearby Lake summer resort  
on July 1, in the interests of the Hy-  
dro-radial line from Toronto to  
Bridgeburg.

J. E. Rebstock, President of the Cris-  
tal Beach Board of Trade, has just re-  
turned from Toronto, where he inter-  
viewed Sir Adam Beck in regard to  
the necessity of the Hydro lines getting  
into Buffalo and the necessity for a  
bridge over the river here that will ac-  
commodate radials, auto and pedestrian  
traffic. This portion of the big cele-  
bration may be linked with the Peace  
Memorial Bridge efforts.

Sir Adam Beck will be the princi-  
pal speaker at the big celebration to  
be held on the first of July. A general  
committee to secure other speakers  
has been named, consisting of J. F.  
Rebstock, M. J. McAlpine, W. P. Cor-  
roy, W. G. Athoe and Dr. Geo. E.  
Snyder. There will also be speakers  
from the American side of the river,  
following which a banquet will be given  
to the international spokesman at-  
tending, including guests from Buffalo  
and Erie County, N. Y. organizations.

CHAUTAQUA WEEK  
June 19th to 24th. On the Sixth Day  
Hear, Tom Skegill, Australian Sol-  
dier-Poet. Here of Four Battle  
Fronts.

It is rather an unusual lecture sit-  
uation which can secure two columns  
of appreciation in such a magazine as  
"The Literary Digest," yet that is the  
honour which fell to Tom Skegill, the  
Australian, on December 29,  
1918. Skegill is about the greatest living  
figure which has come out of the World  
War. A boy of sixteen when he had es-  
tablished for himself something of a  
reputation in Australia as a poet and  
philosopher, threw down his pen at the  
beginning of the war to volunteer with  
the Australian forces, and as a member  
of the Eighth Australian Infantry Bat-  
talion Anzac Division, he assisted in  
making history in the Gallipoli cam-  
paign. He saw a great many of the  
battlefields of Europe during his period  
of service on the active front, and after  
being twice desperately wounded he  
was invalided home to his native land,  
battered, blind and helpless. For  
over two years he lived in a land of  
unfathomable darkness, but his un-  
quenchable spirit would not allow  
him to be still while the enemies of  
his country were thumping at her  
door. He came to America in 1917  
in assisting this country to the doing  
of her full duty in the great conflict  
and was immediately greeted upon his  
arrival by one of the most unique and im-  
peting speakers which the war has pro-  
duced. At the National Capital cele-  
brated American surgeons performed  
a miracle operation and restored his  
sight and in gratitude to America for  
that wonderful gift to him, "Skegill"  
fairly outdid himself in his patriotic  
addresses.

However, Tom Skegill saw the  
war as a poet. He saw its grandeur  
its wonder, its beauty, and its awe,  
but not its horror, and so his story  
harrowing or gruesome. Laugh-  
ter and thrills are cleverly mingled,  
and his descriptions stand out as  
wonderful pictures of a world at war.  
As a poet, he has attracted much  
more than ordinary attention. A book  
of his poems has been published by  
Doubleday, Page and Company. A  
number of these poems, notably, "My  
Little Wet Home in the Trench" and  
"Pull through," have been widely  
quoted.

He is unquestionably the greatest  
soldier-lecturer of the day.
