That Misleading Speech of Mr. Pugsley's.

(From the News of Toronto.)

A politician-for-revenue-only always can be trusted to drag politics into every question, it is not strange, therefore, that Mr. Pugsley accuses the Landry Commission of partisanship. He complains that his enemies have conspired to ruin him. Talk like that has been heard before. Every pickpocket who is brought before the courts accuses the police of plotting against him. If he were honest he would have no trouble. So also, if Mr. Pugsley, this "smooth proposition" from New Brunswick, had played a square game himself he would not be so ready to accuse others of cheating. The man with axes up his sleeve is always the one to scrutinize his opponents' clothing. Let it be understood that Mr. Pugsley did not acquire without cause that uncomplimentary nickname whereby he is called from Campbellford to the Sea. "Slippery Bill" is not the product of a straightforward public career.

Mr. Pugsley's speech in the house was "smooth" of course. But it was not true, and he knows it. The first mis-statement was that he had never taken a dollar from the Provincial Treasury to which he was not entitled. At one time his salary account was overdrawn by \$7,000. After he was appointed Minister of Public Works he paid the Province \$2,000 which he still owed. One cannot but wonder at the colossal assurance of the man in imagining that this thing is forgotten so soon.

Mr. Pugsley said that the Commissioners did not ask the president of the company or the directors to file an account of their receipts and disbursements from the beginning to the end. This is a slight change in wording from his first complaint. Formerly he said that he himself had no opportunity to make an accounting before the Commission. But in view of the fact that the president and directors did nothing and that Mr. Pugsley did everything, the complaint is really the same. This is true. Judge Landry adjourned the inquiry to accommodate Mr. Pugsley. He also wrote him to the effect that it was most important that he should make his statements as to the disposition of the money. Moreover, Mr. Pugsley came upon the stand knowing from the preliminary report of a chartered accountant that there was a shortage of over \$100,000. He professed to give the Commission everything he knew, but he absolutely failed to give any satisfactory account of the shortage. Mr. Barnhill, counsel for Mr. Pugsley, said that he had made investigations, but could throw no light on the disappearance of the money.

Mr. Pugsley says that the balance of the purchase price of the railway—\$39,500—was improperly deducted by the Commissioners from their statement of expenditures. Yet Evans swore that all his firm received was \$140,400.00. Against this statement the mere uncorroborated declaration of the accused cannot be accepted as conclusive. And, in view of its plain and certain falsity, what reliance can be placed on the interest accounts which Mr. Pugsley manufactures, and sets forth to the sound of the trumpet? Mr. Pugsley has a good deal to say yet before he will clear himself of these damaging accusations, and the character of the Commissioners is not to be destroyed by his wild statements and their echo in Government newspapers.

United States Senator Benjamin F. Tillman indirectly paid a tribute to the Catholic position on the divorce question in the course of a speech recently delivered before the New York Society of South Carolinians. Speaking of a distinguished and commendable trait of his fellow South Carolinians he said: "I have traveled all around this country, and there is one thing about a South Carolinian that distinguishes him from the citizens of the rest of the country. And that is, that he has just one girl and when she grows old he doesn't look round for a younger woman, and go to some judge and for some trivial cause frequently triumphed up, get rid of the girl who has been with him all his life." South Carolina is the only State in the Union in which a divorce cannot be obtained for any reason and in which the solemn pledge man and wife gave when they plighted their faith to each other remain in force until death annuls it.

Fish and Game Protection.

(Montreal Gazette.)

The value of the fish and game resources of a country is well illustrated in the case of Maine, in which, it is estimated, at least fifteen million dollars a year are spent by residents of other states who go there in search of sport with rod and gun, and find it because the people have recognized what protection can do for the preservation of their resources. The Belle ville Ontario, in pointing this out, refers to the fact that the total produce of the Cobalt mines in 1907 was a little over \$6,000,000, and that most of this money went out of the country, while the fifteen millions spent in Maine was scattered among the people even to the most remote sections. The comparison is valuable because it forcibly illustrates the wealth lying in the fish and game of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. This value does not lie in the revenue accruing to the government, but in the money distributed by visitors. The fish caught by the average sportsman costs him several dollars a pound. It is not the fish he pays for, however, but the recreation and he will go where that can be found. The success of Maine does not lie in any marked superiority of its laws, but in the fact that the laws are lived up to because the residents of the state in the neighborhoods in which game fish and game abound are zealous self-constituted guardians of the law. They see that its provisions are respected by their neighbors and their visitors. As a result there are lakes in Maine which are as well stocked today as ever they were with game fish, but which were located in either Ontario or Quebec, would long ago have been fished out. Education in the value of preservation is what is required in those four Canadian Provinces.
