

Local and Other Items

The Caledonia Club Gathering will be held in Charlottetown this year on August 25th.

Word was received Saturday, 22nd, at the Board of Trade, Montreal, that the Swiss trade delegation to North America for the purpose of extending trade relations would arrive in Montreal early in June.

Rushing out of her home, her clothes wrapped in flames, while her year old baby was contentedly sleeping, Mrs. Wm. Gosmore of the seventh concession of Brooke, Ontario, on May 27th fell a few feet from the doorstep and perished from burns.

Nearly 500 half-starved, emaciated children, between the ages of six and twelve, from the Austrian war zone, arrived at Folkestone, England, on May 27 from Vienna, and were greeted at the wharf by crowds of British children.

The sixty-sixth annual commencement exercises of St. Dunstan's University, held Monday afternoon, was an event of more than usual importance in the educational life of this Province.

Forest Fires Cause Great Damage

St. John, N. B., May 30.—The forest fire situation in New Brunswick is reported somewhat improved, according to Chief Forester Prince.

The fire at Glennis, County Sunbury, had been extinguished and those which had been sweeping Restigouche county are reported under control.

A new outbreak has occurred about ten miles from Salisbury, Westmorland county. The warden for that district rushed a crew of men to the scene and reported to headquarters that it was not of a serious nature, and he hoped to check it before it made much headway.

A report as received by the department of lands and mines on Saturday afternoon that a fire had broken out in the settlement of Allanville, in Northumberland county, resulting in the destruction of five houses and their contents.

Fires reached Plaster Rock and Perth, in Victoria County and are still burning, so far as is known. A fire near Restigouche, Sudbury County, was reported today.

Moncton, N. B., May 30.—The eastern part of New Brunswick with the exception of Kings County, some days ago, has been remarkably free from forest fires. No fires of consequence have been reported in Westmorland.

The Wheat Grows.

Advices of May from Regina say: "Wheat measuring eight inches from root to tip was brought to the city by Thomas Watt, of Fort Qu' Appelle. He says that he sowed it two weeks ago on summer fallow, and that in all his experience in farming in the west he never saw wheat make such rapid growth in that period."

New York, June 1.—Ten men were injured today when a fire started in the forward hatch of the Steamship Powhatan which is being overhauled in the Morse dry dock Brooklyn. Five of the injured were firemen. All will probably recover.

Local and Other Items

Frank Goodall, aged 63, an employe of the Canadian National Railway, died Sunday night in the Moncton Hospital as the result of injuries received Saturday noon by being run over by an automobile.

Struck and run over by a street car in front of his home Saturday afternoon, Fernand Dubou, aged three of Montreal, died instantly. Both legs had been nearly amputated and the head crushed by the impact. The car had to be jacked up to remove the body.

Harold Normandy, aged 29 years, was instantly killed at Brooklyn, three miles from Yarmouth, N. S. While engaged in removing a large rock in front of his residence, he undermined it and the rock weighing ten tons, fell on him and crushed him to death.

From Leeds, England, comes this information: Experiments are being conducted at the Textile Institute in manufacturing by a chemical process artificial wool from cellulose derived from cotton waste. The efforts have been very successful and, although it is only a substitute for wool it is said to have great wearing possibilities especially if used with other fabrics.

The tern schooner, John Wood, was run down at sea on the 23rd by the steamer Lake Lash, and sank almost instantly. The crew were rescued, and landed at Portland, Maine. The vessel was on her way from Barbadoes to St. John's, Nfld., with 600 cuneons of molasses. The loss is estimated at \$90,000, and is only partially covered by insurance.

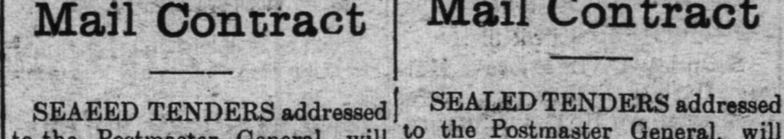
