Turn where you may, and the tendency for embroideries is exhibited on every side in the shape of entire costumes of Swiss lawn, voile, mangellette, batiste, etc., insertion, edging, all-over and motifs for trimming, narrower and smaller designs for children, etc.

Quaint trifles seem to be the desideratum of the house in millinery as well as in dresses and coats. In fact, there is a distinct return or rather trend, forwards old time fashions in every line of dress, though in millinery it is more distinct than in gowns.

Little crochet flowers, butterflies and discs are now added to fabric. They are of wool in some of the newest creations, and are embellished by handwork in outline stitches for the stems. This decoration is particularly effective on sashes and girdles of dark velvet.

One of the favorite accessories of the moment is composed of a wide band of velvet, black, blue or of a shade that will harmonize with the suit. The band fastening in the back under a flat bow is surrounded on the lower edge by a double ruffle of plaited tulle which lies absolutely flat.

There are a few changes in bags, and all are still made after the one model, the alms bag. They are so heavily decorated with metals as almost entirely to hide the foundation of morocco or chamois. The flaps fasten with simple patent catches or with costly buttons set with emeralds or rubies.

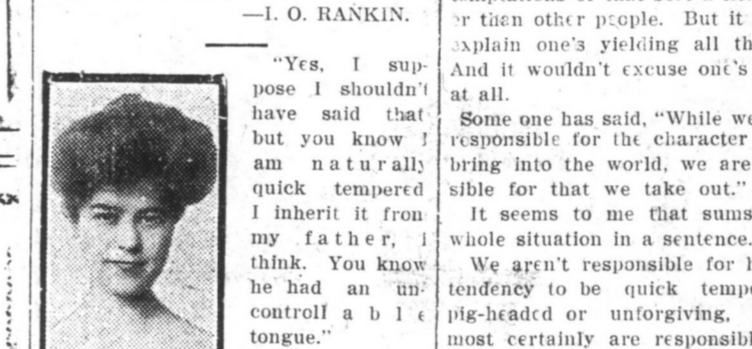

**MAN STILL MISSING.**—Mr. Abbott of Bonavista who left his home about two weeks ago has not yet been found. Search parties have given up looking for him.

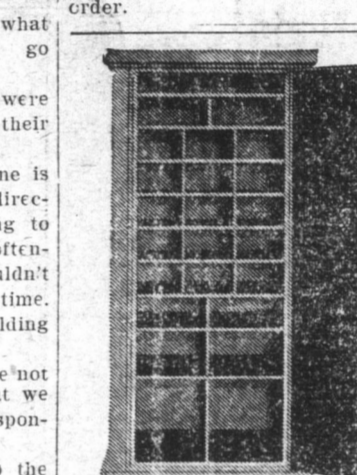
