
Bloomfield, N.J., has invented a device which he says will assist women wearing hobble skirts in getting aboard trains. The device, which is worked by hydraulic pressure, con sists of an iron jack to which is attached a cushioned chair worked by two levers. The "lift" is placed in front of the platform of the car. When the woman is seated in the chair the operator presses a handle which lifts the chair up in line with the platform of the car.
