#### Still Waiting

The Government has up to the present declined to throw any light upon the dispute with the Contractor about taking the Bonavista Branch Railway into the heart of Trinity West.

It cannot be successfully denied that a dispute did arise, and the Government has not admitted to the public any evidence of success in surmounting the difficulties which arose.

Indeed the evidence available points distinctly to the failure of the attempt of the Government to induce the Contractor to build the spur line as part and parcel of the general contract for which he is to be paid at \$15,000. Their failure is clear from the fact that the Contractor continued his work to Bonavista without building it. It is evident also from the fact that the Contractor began the building of the station at Jenkins' farm, and began it too without the approval of the Government, who warned him he had commenced the building of the station at his own risk, and not without the approval called for in section 24 of the Construction Contract. The existence of the dispute is evidenced by the notification from the Government to the Contractor

that "no further payment will be made on account of the Bonavista Branch line until such time as the line has been brought into Trinity proper."

This notification also contains the implication that the Government was insisting on the building of the Spur Line as part and parcel of the general contract for which payment had been agreed upon at \$15,000 a mile.

How then did it come about that a dispute could arise about the Spur Line? The origin of the dispute is not difficult to find, even in the absence of any disclosure by the Government. Read the last clause of section 2, viz.:

"All the said Branches shall follow, as nearly as may be practicable, the routes that may be decided by the Government."

It is clear that the words we have printed in black type may afford the Contractor the right to contend that the building of the Spur Line is so sufficiently impracticable that he cannot be compelled to build it as part of the Branch Line that he is to be paid for at \$15,000 a mile.

We have no direct evidence before us that such an attitude has been taken up by the Contractor, but the existence of the dispute points to such a contention.

The words quoted are part of the contract to which the Great Seal of Newfoundland was affixed by order of the Governor in Council to which the signature of R. Watson was appended as Colonial Secretary, and the wording of which was approved by

### Boon For Placentia.

By the Portia we hear that it is reported along the coast that the Gorton, Pew Co. of Gloucester, and Cunningham & Thompson will erect a large fishing plant each in Placentia Bay. These firms are aware that Placentia is almost always open for the whole year, and in their proper season caplin, squid, cod, herring, salmon and sole are very plentiful in the Bay, while the harbour is contiguous to the prolific fishing grounds of Cape St. Mary's and the Banks of the shore which would give them all the salt bulk fish required for the whole summer and fall. It is not at all unlikely that in a short time the work of erecting these plants will begin and that Placentia will receive a big boom.

It means that the Government has directed the Contractor to build it as an extra under contract 34, then the Contractor will no doubt face the cost of the extra engineering difficulties, as section 26 provides that the Government shall pay the fair value of the work, no matter if it costs \$100,000 a mile.

Meanwhile the people are waiting for the information which their trustee, the Government, has so far disdained to vouchsafe.

#### DIED.

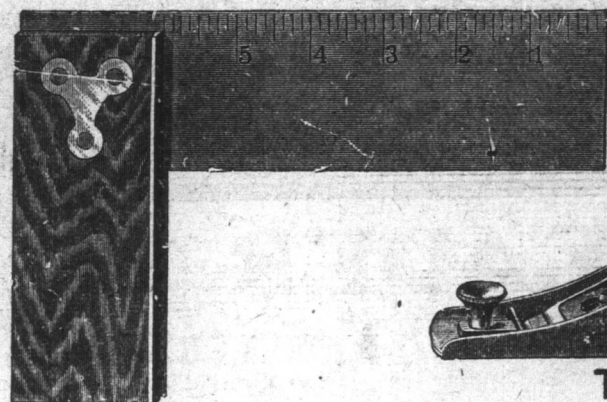

### A Settlement Probably Made.

PARIS, To-Day. The Cabinet met yesterday, and the French reply to Germany's latest suggestions for an agreement was approved unanimously. Since Germany's proposals were drawn up after two long conversations between the German Foreign Minister and the French Ambassador, it will probably be found that France has accepted the arrangement proposed regarding Morocco itself, the question remaining for settlement being details of the cessions of Germany in French Congo.

### Big Bank Merger.

LONDON, To-Day. Negotiations are completed for the absorption of the Colonial Bank by the Royal Bank of Canada. Mr. Neill, the assistant general manager of the Royal Bank is here in connection with the amalgamation, which is very important not only to the Royal Bank but to the West Indies and Canada for it will bring the Dominion and the Islands more closely into touch. The Colonial Bank was established in London seventy-five years ago. Its head offices is in that city, but apart from that office, all the branches, sixteen in number, are in the West Indies.

### South African Defence.
