War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, (Official) May 2.
In Argonne, a strong German re-
countering party was dispersed
north of Harasce. Later reports show
that the attacks launched by us on
the 29th and 30th April on the slopes
at Mort Homme, enabled us to cap-
ture a thousand yards of front, and
ranging from three to six hundred
metres in depth. East of the Meuse
a spirited attack against the enemy's
position, S.E. of Doncourt fort, which
which fully succeeded, enabled us to
capture a German trench of the first
line on a length of 500 metres, to-
gether with the capture of 100 prison-
ers.

SITUATION IN DUBLIN IMPROVING

DUBLIN, May 2.
While the situation outside Dublin
is not so satisfactory to-day as in the
city itself, it is improving. The au-
thorities expect that a few days
should see the last of the armed re-
bellion in Ireland. A flicker is still
apparent, not far from Dublin, where
a small group of adherents of James
Larkin have esconced themselves fur-
ther west in the capital. There still
are bands of insurgents in being. The
rebels are sceptical of the assurances
given them that their comrades in
Dublin have surrendered, as the re-
sult of the prompt measures by the
authorities. A mobile force is moving
into the mountains to-day, preventing
the Sinn Feiners from assembling and
arresting their leaders.

GENERAL AND IMMEDIATE COM- PULSION.

LONDON, May 2.
Asquith declared in the Commons
this afternoon that the Bill to be in-
troduced to-morrow would be one of
general and immediate compulsion,
and said that he hoped to give an
early opportunity for the discussion
of the motion calling for the resigna-
tion of the Chief Secretary of Ireland.
Immediate compulsion, the Prime
Minister announced, and the whole re-
cruiting problem would be dealt with
in a single bill. Mr. Asquith said that
while in August, 1914, the British Ar-
my at home and overseas consisted of
twenty-six divisions, there were now
seventy-one divisions, including the
naval division.

FORMERLY THE YACHT "ERIN"

LONDON, May 2.
The British armed yacht *Agassia*,
the sinking of which by a mine was
announced yesterday, was formerly
the *Erin*, Sir Thomas Lipton's private
yacht. It was taken over by the Brit-
ish Admiralty and used as a patrol
ship. Later she was armed. Before
being sent to the Mediterranean, where
she was sunk, she had been on patrol
duty in the North Sea. The *Erin*
conveyed Shamrock IV to New
York for the Cup races, which were
to have been held in 1914.

ASQUITH IN THE COMMONS.

LONDON, May 2.
In addressing the Commons, Mr.
Asquith said the public was naturally
depressed by the deplorable incident
of the surrender of the *Erin*. He in-
vited the House to turn to the speeches
delivered during a previous crisis in the
history of the country, and it would
be found that charges of exactly the
same nature were made. There had
been the same charges and accusa-
tions of indecision, procrastination,
half-heartedness and delay, exactly
the same cry for a saviour, the com-
bination of saviours. At one moment
the people were told that the civilians
in the cabinet had overruled their
military and naval experts, and had
been the charge with reference to
Gallipoli. At another moment it was
said that the civilians in the cabinet
were too subservient to their military
advisers. My answer to all this, As-
quith continued, is that if there have
been mistakes or blunders, perhaps
both of policy and strategy, the con-
tribution of the United Kingdom and
Empire has grown and is growing
steadily, month by month, and better
directed than ever before. The rival
naval and military situation of the Allies
has never been so good as it is to-
day. We have to put up with these
things, the Premier said. He added
that the Government would not be
disturbed by them so long as it re-
tained the confidence of the country.
After reviewing carefully the condi-
tions under which recruiting had
been carried out, the Premier said it
had been decided that the men requir-
ed could not, and would not be ob-
tained in due time by existing meth-
ods. Coming to the conclusion that
the existing machinery would not
provide the men required in the ne-
cessary time, Mr. Asquith said that
the Cabinet had decided to make pro-
vision for the men included in the bill
brought in last week, which was
withdrawn. An additional 200,000 un-
stated married men were essential

NEW YORK, May 2.

A Salonika despatch to the News
Agency here to-day says that a Turk-
ish transport of the *Chirkei* Mairie
was sunk off Rodento in the Sea of
Marmora, by a British submarine, ac-
cording to an announcement made
here to-day. No details are available,
but it is believed here several hun-
dred Turkish troops on board were
drowned.

ASSUMING NORMAL CONDITIONS.

LONDON, (Official), May 2.
A despatch from headquarters
reads: Dublin is gradually assuming
normal conditions, the work of clear-
ing some small districts around Irish-
town being carried out by the ever-
contracting cordon of Cork. All is
quiet in the county with the exception
of an affray in Fermoy district, where
the police attempting to arrest two
men in a house met with armed re-
sistance, the head constable being
shot dead. On arrival of reinforce-
ments the occupants of the house, two
of whom were wounded, surrendered.
Sinn Feiners in Cork City where there
has been no rising yielded up their
arms.

MORE RUSSIAN TROOPS ARRIVE AT MARSEILLES.

MARSEILLES, May 2.
A further contingent of Russian
troops arrived at this Mediterranean
port to-day.

GREEK STEAMER SUPPOSED LOST

ATHENS, May 2.
It is assumed in shipping circles
here that the Greek steamer *Georgios*,
grain laden, which left New York two
months ago with a crew of 25, has
been lost at sea. The vessel had a
cargo estimated to be worth \$600,000.

Knocked Down by Auto

At the junction of Cochrane
and Duckworth Streets last evening, a
woman who was leaving the street car
was hit by a passing automobile and
thrown to the ground. However, as
the auto was moving at a very slow
speed the woman was not seriously
hurt, she was able to walk to her
home without the need of assistance.

SINKING CONTINUES.

LONDON, May 2.
A wireless despatch received to-
day from North Foreland Station,
from the Dutch steamer *Batavia*, an-
nounced that the *Fritland* was sink-
ing. This Swedish vessel sailed from
Portland on April 14th, for Rotter-
dam, and had 7,000 tons of wheat on
board. The British steamer *Hendon*
Hall, which was yesterday reported
as sunk, while bound from Portland
and Loughsbury for Rotterdam, also
had been chartered by the Belgian
Relief Commission.

ASQUITH ON RECRUITING.

LONDON, May 2.
Asquith foreshadowed in the Com-
mons to-day the intention of the Gov-
ernment to-morrow to introduce a bill
providing for the immediate compul-
sion of men of military age. The
Premier reviewed the recent contro-
versy over the question of recruiting,
and gave some figures showing what
the British Empire had done since the
outbreak of the war. He said that
the army, which at the beginning of
the war consisted of 26 divisions, now
amounted to 83, including the naval
division and contributions from the
Dominions, but excluding India. To
obtain five million men for the army
and navy, which had been done, in-
volved prodigious effort both at home
and throughout the Empire. Recruiting
was still being maintained with
some occasional lapses. There were
two limiting conditions, the Premier
continued, in the matter of recruiting
that applied to England, but not to
either of the belligerents, namely, the
maintenance of the army on the sea,
both by means of the navy and the
mercantile marine, and the financing
of the nations of the Allies.

Seallishery Over.

S.S. Ranger Brings Home the Key—
Voyage a Big Success—Valued at
Over a Million Dollars.

The s.s. *Ranger*, Capt. Wm. Bartlett,
Jr., the last arrival from the Gulf,
crept into port last midnight, having
"closed the gates" and brought home
the "key" of the 1916 seallishery. She
has 3,500 seals. The *Ranger's* report
is practically similar to that of the
Viking and Diana. Ice and weather
conditions in the Gulf this season
were the worst in the memory of the
oldest sealer. The *Ranger* had hard
luck. First she was jammed for a
considerable while and subsequently
after striking the whitecoats the ice
broke up and the ship lost about 70
pans. Capt. Bartlett states the land-
men around the Magdalen Islands did
well this spring. The *Ranger* did very
little in the working of old seals. The
voyage is ended and there is much to
be thankful for. A significant aspect
is that not a single serious accident
occurred out of the 2,300 men who
participated in the fishery. This alone
is a gratifying fact. It may be men-
tioned though, that two deaths,
through natural causes, occurred on
board the s.s. *Erik* in the early part
of the spring. The total catch will
probably aggregate 250,000 seals in-
cluding 30,000 landed by the Halifax
steamer *Seal* to be brought on here by
schooner from Channel. The *Seal*
cleared from the Custom House at St.
John's for the Nfld. seallishery, and
therefore her catch will be included in
the total. Altogether the voyage has
been remarkably successful for such
a small fleet of twelve ships, roughly
223,000 being brought in by the eight
ships which prosecuted the hunt on
the northern grounds. Considering
the extraordinary weight of the white-
coats and the equally extraordinary
high price of \$8 paid for young fat,
this year's catch of a quarter of a
million will be more valuable than
300,000 of an ordinary year with ordi-
nary prices ruling. We estimate
that the fat brought in this spring will
be worth to the country over \$600,000,
which added to the value of the skins,
approximately another \$400,000, will
yield a grand total of over one million
dollars.

Supreme Court.

Present: Chief Justice Horwood.
THE KING VS. JOB H. ROBERTS—
JURY DISAGREES.

The Court which rose at 1 p.m. yes-
terday for recess continued at 2.30 p.
m. and several witnesses were exam-
ined by Mr. Howley, K. C. and Mr.
Emerson and cross-examined by Mr.
Higgins. At 5 p.m. the Court rose for
half an hour and continued from 5.30
to 6 p.m. when recess was taken un-
til 7.30 when Howley, K. C., addressed
the jury till 8.30. Mr. Higgins follow-
ed and spoke till 9.30, after which His
Lordship the Chief Justice charged
the jury who retired at 9.55 and re-
mained out till 1.05 this morning
when they took their places in the
Court and through their foreman, Mr.
Thomas Pope, announced to the Court
that the jury could not agree upon a
verdict. The Chief Justice again
addressed the jury and directed them
to retire and try and reach a decision.
At 3 a.m. they again filed into Court,
the foreman again informed the Court
that no decision had been reached,
whereupon the Chief Justice dismissed
the jury.

The Court intimated that a new
trial would be held on Friday this
week. Bail was granted, the prisoner
furnishing bonds for \$5,000 and
Messrs. Sellars and Templeman, \$2-
500 each.
