SPA CONFERENCE IN JUNE.

LONDON, May 30.
The Spa conference will take place
on the previously appointed date, ac-
cording to a report forwarded to the
London Times by its Paris correspond-
ent. Although Premier Nitti of Italy
asked for a postponement until July,
the French and British Governments,
the Correspondent declares, are in
agreement that the June date should
be adhered to.

GREEKS OCCUPY TOWNS.

ATHENS, May 30.
Greek troops have occupied Dedea-
gatch and Giumurjina, according to an
official communication issued to-day.
The Communiqué adds that a consid-
erable force of covering troops has
been sent toward the Bulgarian fron-
tier. Troops proceeding to Kerdjals
encountered Bulgarian regulars. One
Bulgarian soldier was taken prisoner
and another slightly wounded. A
subaltern also was slightly wounded.

AVIATION FATALITY.

MEXICO CITY, May 30.
Four persons were killed, and more
than a score were seriously injured
here to-day, when a large military
biplane crashed to the ground, and its
gasoline tank exploded. Breakdown of
the plane's motors is believed to have
caused the crash.

WARSHIPS FOR IRELAND.

LONDON, May 30.
The National News says "The posi-
tion in Ireland, we understand, is so
grave that a number of warships are
now being fitted out in sheerness for
despatch to Irish ports. The situation
is more serious than would appear
from published telegrams, and stat-
ing developments are expected in a
few days. In the present temper of the
Sinn Féiners it is not unlikely they
will make a last effort against the
forces of law and order."

BOLSHEVIKS AT RESHT.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 31.
Resht, an important city in Persia,
sixteen miles southeast of Enzeli, the
most important Caspian seaport of
that country, and about a hundred
and fifty miles northwest of Teheran,
has been occupied by Russian Bolshe-
vik troops, according to advices re-
ceived by the Persian Legation here.

AFTER THE DOLLARS.

LONDON, May 31.
A wireless despatch received from
Moscow, says that 16 New York firms
and several firms from other cities in
the United States have requested the
Russian Soviet Government imme-

diately to resume trade relations with
them.

ANTI-UNION MEASURE.

LONDON, May 31.
The Cabinet has approved the Gov-
ernment's proposed law, which would
prohibit organizations forming them-
selves into trades unions or affiliating
with the labor federation. The mea-
sure will be introduced in Parliament
on Tuesday.

EX-EMPRESS INDISPOSED.

LONDON, May 31.
The Handesblad, of Amsterdam,
states that the former German Em-
press has been ordered by her phy-
sician to take as much rest as possi-
ble. She is reported to be indisposed
as a result of over-exertion through
a recent removal to Boort.

PREPARING MILITARY COUP.

BERLIN, May 30.
A newspaper of Frankfort-on-Oder
learns that the military party there is
organizing an anti-Republican Coup
for June 5 or 6, when it is intended to
prevent the elections. The action has
been carefully prepared, according to
the paper, and will be carried out un-
der the leadership of four Generals.
Twenty three hundred officers, in the
uniform of private soldiers, have been
fully equipped as the Frankfort as-
sault detachment. The capture of Ber-
lin will be conducted from Pomerania,
with Greifswald as the base of opera-
tions. It is hoped to prevent a repul-
sion of the general strike by arresting
the most important Labor leaders.
Hanover will be the center for the
Coup in Central Germany.
