epartment. Some are splitting herin troughs of pickle from which the ish are taken and suspended on hooks ready to be placed in the kilns. Others are rapidly putting caplin on rods preparatory to hanging them in the smokers. The small fish such as herring and caplin are smoked overnight. The larger fish such as cod, and salmon take a little longer.

In the basement heaps of sawdust and chips are to be seen, ready for use in the kilns. Spruce and pine sawdust is chiefly used but oak has been found to give the best results. Two small furnaces which generate heat through pipes which are used for drying fish are also in this basement.


