

TREASURE THAT FLASHED LIK LINES OF LIGHTNING.

Lord Carnarvon gave a further a ies in the Valley of the Tombs of t Kings at Thebes, in Egypt, follow a lecture by Professor Newberry before the Egypt Exploration Society in the Central Hall, Westmins General Sir John Maxwell presided and there was a crowded audience. Lord Carnarvon said:

Close to where I found this tomb there is a large triang Rameses II. up to the tomb of Mne and down to the tomb of Rameses The excavation of that space occu Mr. Carter and myself two se and we used a railway to carry awa the debris. We discovered that it untouched ground, that nobody pre tically had ever dug there, and there was no tomb to be found. We find, however, 12 or 14 alabaster ja had been shoved out of the tomb Mnestra, and apparently forgotten.

In this triangular space we m have moved from 50,000 to 70,000 of rubbish, but we came upon n ing. We went on until we were w five or ten yards of the tomb Rameses' VI. Mr. Carter had been o there digging for three days when ! came upon the first steps of this tom When we started digging down t staircase we came to a door, or sealed-up wall, covered with seal The seals were not at all easy to dis-

mains of the vizier of Thothmes III and we thought that this might b Rek-Ma-Ra's tomb, but when we g to this door or sealed wall, after great deal of trouble, we discover the cartouche of Tut-ankh Amen. O the right we noticed that a portion of the cartouche was missing. Eviden a hole had been made there and ha been resealed, and instead of havin the seal of Tut-ankh Amen it had th

On taking this wall away we g into a passage blocked up wit stones, and it was perfectly easy t see where plunderers had gone in They had made a hole at the right hand corner big enough for a sma man to crawl through.
