INTER CLUB BILLIARDS.	
B. L. S. Leading By 440 Points.	

In last night's games of the inter club billiard tournament, played at the B.I.S. rooms, the Clubs again divided the honors, but on the total scores the B.I.S. added 97 points to their lead, bringing it up to 440 points.

The first players to string off were A. Sellars (Masonic) and S. Constantine (B.I.S.) and an interesting game resulted. At the very beginning Sellars took the lead and at the hundred mark was 100 points ahead. After this Constantine got a run, and soon was on a level with his opponent. For a time both players passed and re-passed each other and they tied at 298. Here Sellars made a 36 break, which was followed by a 19 and a 17 by Constantine, who was 342 when his opponent was 344. Sellars then made the necessary six, and the final scores were: Sellars 350; Constantine, 342. The breaks were:—

At the Masonic rooms Sellars defeated Constantine by 61 points.

The second pair to play were N. Wadden (B.I.S.) and H. Dickinson (Masonic) and this also proved an interesting game. At the beginning of play Dickinson got the balls running and when he had reached the century mark was leading by seventy points. Here, however, his luck turned and for the balance of the game he could not get the balls to run. Wadden on the other hand had matters practically in his own hands, and he gave a fine exhibition. He soon overtook his opponent and after passing him increased the lead to 105 points, the final scores being Wadden, 350; Dickinson, 245. The breaks were:—

FOOTBALL COACH LEFT \$74,500 TO HIS WIDOW.

DEDHAM, Mass., Dec. 4.—The late Percy D. Haughton, famous Harvard and Columbia University football coach, left an estate consisting of \$70,000 in personal property, and real estate valued at \$4,500. Under the terms of the will, which was filed in the Norfolk County Probate Court, Wednesday, his widow, Mrs. Glendolyn Houghton, is the sole beneficiary.

NEWS AND GOSSIP OF THE PRO. BOXERS AND WRESTLERS.

Sid Terrell, the little Ghetto lightweight from the East Side of New York and Sammy Mandell, who learned boxing from the soldiers in the wartime army camp at Rockford, Ill., have been tentatively matched for a 15 round battle here next February, in which the lightweight championship may be decided.

This bout would nominate beyond any dispute the runner-up to Benny Leonard. And then if Leonard should confess his inability to make the lightweight limit any more, the winner would be recognized as champion. Leonard at present appears to be far above 135 pounds, and, in a show-down he might follow the example of Johnny Dundee, who confessed he was no longer a featherweight and vacated the title.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—Tex Rickard is ready to out-gamble any of the California promoters who, encouraged by the passage of a new California boxing law, attempt to bid against him for Jack Dempsey's new fight. Rickard's press agent sent out a typed state paper Wednesday in which he said Rickard plans to toss Dempsey and Tom Gibbons into the famous old dog-pit of Madison Square Garden for a sequel to their fight, at Selby, Mont., as the grand finale of the Garden.

## A Record Gas-Pipe

A steel tube, 16in. in diameter and 210 miles long, which, when completed, will be one single piece, is under construction between Beaumont, Texas, and the natural-gas fields near Shreveport, United States.

That a jointless tube of such tremendous length is possible is due to the fact that every junction between sections is sealed by oxy-acetylene welding. Ordinarily they would be joined together by screw couplings. This pipe line, which will carry natural gas to Beaumont, crosses two rivers, many creeks, and runs underground through four States.
