PRESIDENT KRUGER SAID TO HAVE PROPOSED PEACE

Message Was Couched in an Exceedingly Humble Strain.

The Making Relief Arrangements Evident in Riot in London and in Aberdeen Where a "Stop the War" Meeting Was Being Held—Queen Expresses Her Thanks for Relief in a Court Circular.

London, May 21.—(3.10 a. m.)—Displayed in the most conspicuous style in The Daily Express is the dominant war news of the morning: "We have the best reason for saying that in the last twenty-four hours a telegram has been received at the Foreign Office, addressed personally to the Prime Minister, from President Kruger, proposing terms of peace."

The exact terms of the message cannot be stated, but we believe it is couched in an exceedingly humble strain.

"It is inconceivable, of course, that Lord Salisbury can have sent any reply except the one that stands ready on the lips of every Briton: "Unconditional Surrender."

The boisterous rejoicings over the news from Mafeking have become riots in parts of London, Aberdeen and Belfast, and elsewhere in the United Kingdom.

The house of a Boer sympathizer at Hartlesden was attacked by a large crowd and the windows were shattered. The police charged the mob, and were greeted with a shower of decayed eggs. Numerous arrests were made and the police reserves were called out.

Rioting in Aberdeen.

Rioting took place in Aberdeen from 7 to 10 o'clock Saturday evening around a hall where a "Stop the War" meeting was being addressed by Mr. Cronwright-Schreiner, husband of Olive Schreiner.

At Dover the Business Establishment of Mr. J. Browne, a member of the Local Chamber of Commerce, was wrecked by a mob.

HOW THE QUEEN SEES IT.

Expresses Her Thankfulness for the News of the Relief of Mafeking—First Official Notice.

London, May 21.—Sunday night's court circular contains the following: "The Queen received on Friday night with the greatest gratification and thankfulness the news of the relief of Mafeking, after a heroic defence of over seven months by Col. Baden-Powell and troops under his command."

CAPTURED EVERYTHING.

British Relieving Force Got the Whole Investing Army and Guns at Mafeking.

London, May 21.—A despatch to The Daily Mail from Lorenzo Marquez, dated Sunday, says: On Thursday the entire Boer force around Mafeking, including the guns, was captured by the British.

ROBERTS HAS NO NEWS.

Confirmed from Malopos. London, May 21.—A special despatch from Malopos, dated May 17, states that a large British force from the south succeeded in entering Mafeking Wednesday and that the siege was raised by the Boers, their commanders withdrawing eastward.

Boers Were Repulsed.

London, May 21.—A special despatch from Cape Town says that the relief column as it approached Mafeking from the south, was attacked by a strong force of Boers, who were repulsed. The rear guard continued in action for some time. The British casualties were slight.

London, May 21.—The Cape Town account of the composition of the relief column says that it consisted of 2,000 men of the South African Light Horse, the Imperial Yeomanry and the Kimberley Horse. It left Kimberley on May 4 with 35 wagons containing stores and ammunition, with four guns of the Horse Artillery and two Maxims and moved west along the railway without meeting opposition. At Kraalpan the Boers fell back when attacked.

Neutral Counsils Have Been Advised to Look After Their Citizens.

Pretoria, May 20.—It is officially announced that Johannesburg will be defended. The consuls of the neutral powers have been advised in great numbers. The brigade consists of four corps of mounted infantry, under Col. Alderson, Col. Fisher and Henry, and Col. Gorman. The first consists of a first battalion of Canadians, under Col. Lessard; a second battalion, under Col. Herchmer, and Strathcona's Horse, under Col. Steele. The second corps consists of the New South Wales Mounted Infantry, under Col. Blears, and the New Zealanders, under Major Boker. The fourth corps consists of the Victorians, under Col. Price; the South Australians, under Capt. Bredie, and the Tasmanians, under Capt. Brown. Each corps has a battalion of Imperial Mounted Infantry attached to it, except the New South Wales corps.

De Wet's Last Stand. London, May 21.—A special despatch from Kroonstad says that Gen. De Wet has sent word that he is prepared to surrender conditionally with his whole commando. It later appeared that the De Wet who offered to surrender with 1,000 men was not the well known Gen. De Wet, but Commandant De Wet. He stipulated that his men should be allowed to return to their farms. Lord Roberts replied that the surrender must be unconditional.

BULLER PRAISES HIS MEN.

They Have Marched 138 Miles in Nine Days.

London, May 21.—The War Office has received the following despatch from Gen. Buller, dated Newcastle, May 19: "Gen. Cleary moved to Ingogo today and Gen. Dundonald to Laining's Nek. We almost caught up with the tail of the enemy's column and have captured a few prisoners and wagons. The men have marched very well indeed. I left Ladysmith May 10, and by the road used, am now 138 miles from there. The telegraph section has been indefatigable and the Service Corps has kept us full of rations all the time. The fifth division also has done great service."
