Spring Wheat vs. Barley.

A committee of the Dominion Millers Association was appointed at the last meeting of the association to take into consideration the question of procuring for the farmers of South Ontario a kind of apring wheat that will ripen a couple of weeks carlier than the kind that has been grown. Careful estimates put the number of bee-keepers in the United States at 350,000; over 10,000 of this number keep more than 500 hives each. The value of the honey produced by them in 1889 was over \$100,000,000, and the value of the bee-wax produced for the same year exceeded \$17,000,000. Many tons of wax were manufactured into ccmb foundation to be used by the bee-keepers in their own apiaries, as it is fully demonstrated that the use of foundation in the apiaries very largely increases the yield of honey. There is little doubt that in the very near future the bee-keeper will use all the wax he produces for comb foundation. One firm made 64,000 pounds of it last year, and found sale for it at home.
