Berlin, March 23 .- The Emperor and Empress of Germany, started this morning from Genoa where, it is said, they will meet the King of Italy and embark on board the Imperial yacht Hohenzollen for a Mediterreanean cruise. It is not definitely known this morning where Emperior Francis Joseph will meet his majesty. Previous to the departure of the Emperor, Gen. Von Werder, the German ambassador to Russia, arrived here and presented his Majesty with an autograph letter from the Czar.

OLYMPIC GAMES. London, March 23.-From 30,000 to 40,000 persons witnessed the preliminary contests at Athens for the purpose of selecting championships to represent Greece in the Olympic games, which will open there on April 5. George, Crown Prince Constantine and Prince George personally supervised the race from Marathon. The distance is 25 miles, and the road is a rough one. The time of the winner was 3 hours and 18 seconds. The winner in the disko throwing scored 29 meters. The diskos weighed two kilograms.

HOCHS FOR BISMARCK. Berlin, March 23.-The German Reichstag anniversary banquet was given Saturday night in the Cupola Hall of the Reichstag building. There were 637 guests. Chancellor Von Hohenlohe delivered a speech in which he ardently lauded the founder of the empire. He referred enthusiastically to the late Emperor Frederick, who, as Crown Prince, had first woven through love the ties that unite the German tribes. He warmly mentioned Prince Bismarck, who, he said, was the last of the great men of that great time. He still stood firm anl erect, like an oak in the Sachsenwald. "Let us," he said, in conclusion, "forget the differences of political strife, and all unite in honoring Bismarck." Hochs were given for the ex-Chancellor, and much enthusiasm was displayed.

BRITISH POLITICS. London, March 23 .- The coming conference of the National Liberal Federation will discuss a special resolution against the Soudan expedition preliminary to the Liberal leaders opening an agitation against it throughout the

country. A series of Government measures have been introduced, including the London Water Bill, which creates a new board for arranging a scheme to purchase the rights of the eight companies, and thereby curtails the privileges of the county council. The Education Bill is promised before the Easter recess. It will be a smaller and weaker measure than has been anficipated. The Cabinet have been divided on the subject, and compromise will hardly satisfy the friends of voluntary schools.

DEATH OF A VETERAN DIVINE. London, March 23.-The Venerable George Anthony Denison, archdeacon of Taunton, is dead, aged 91. In 1853, as a result of a charge of preaching unsound doctrine, brought against him by Dr. Spencer, Bishop of Bath and Wells, Dr. Denison, who was then examining chaplain to the bishop, resigned the chaplaincy and preached in the cathedral at Wells three sermons on "The Real Presence," which he published as his defense. Later, proceedings were taken against the archdeacon on account of matters contained in these sermons, and in 1856 he was sentenced to deprivation of all his preferments. This sentence, however, was set aside upon appeal to the Court of Arches on a point of law. Archdeacon Denison was editor of the Church and State Review at one time, and was chairman of the committees of the lower house of convocation, the reports of which issued in the condemnation of "essays and reviews" and of Dr. Colenso's published writings.

A BAD-MANNERED MINISTER. Berlin, March 23.-It is all conceded on all sides that M. Herbette must be recalled by the French Government very speedily. M. Herbette has made himself so obnoxious to the Emperor that his Majesty is reported to have on more than one occasion absented himself from Berlin in order to avoid the duty of receiving him. Besides this difficulty M. Herbette has made himself disagreeable to many of the German officials, with whom he has come into contact, because of his exceedingly brusque and altogether bad manners, and to Prince Hohenlohe, the Imperial Chancellor, he has become almost intolerable. The consequence has been that Prince Hohenlohe has formerly asked M. Berthelot to appoint M.
