TEMPERATURE.

Toronto, Jan. 9.—11 p.m.—The pressure is highest over the Ottawa Valley, and there is an important storm developing over the South Atlantic States. The weather today has been fine, and moderately cold from Ontario eastward, and very cold in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Edmonton, 24° below—8° below; Prince Albert, 28° below—14° below; Qu'Appelle, 24° below—12° below; Winnipeg, 22° below—6° below; Parry Sound, 12° below—28°; Toronto, 8°—26°; Montreal, 4°—12°; Quebec, 2° below—10°; Halifax, 25°—30°.
