Thomas J. Chisholm, who was arrested on a number of charges, in-cluding that of conspiring to defraud the Merchants' Bank of Halifax out of \$220,000 on bogus warehouse receipts of the Montreal Cold Storage Company, left Montreal on Saturday and has not appeared since.

John Kopte, a Russian Pole, a passenger on the east-bound Baltimore and Ohio train, was robbed last night in a coach east of Athens, Ohio, by three men. Kopte had worked a year in the Corning coal mines, and saved \$100, and was going home to Bremen. No other passengers were disturbed.


