The Chatham Authorities Determined to Stamp Out Gambling.

ESSEX.

The Walkerville postoffice is being removed to the new Sandwich street block.

Large quantities of ice are being brought to Harrow from the lake at Colchester. It is the best that has been harvested for years.

A team owned by a man named McKee went through the late Sandwich Bay and narrowly escaped drowning a day or two ago.

Miss Scott, granddaughter of Henry Malott, of Kingsville, was badly burned by putting in the stove a cloth saturated with gasoline, used to clean her slate.

The North Essex Farmers' Institute at Woodville have elected the following officers: President, J. Cousens, Sandwich West; first vice-president, George Leek; second vice-president, George Pallio; secretary, treasurer, N. J. Clinton. The directors for Windsor are Lincoln Coleman, Wm. McGregor, W. A. McNe.

A Tilbury County correspondent writes: John Cowan, of Shafersburg, broke his arm in two places on Wednesday, and he walked into the village, about four miles, to get the injured limb set, and then did some shopping before walking home again.

W. G. Gaskin, of Clinton, was seized with a coughing spell the other evening, during which he burst a blood vessel. Death resulted in a few minutes.

There died recently at Fredericton, N. B., Helen Hutchison Lizar, relict of the late John Galt, of Goderich, registrar of the county of Huron, and sister-in-law to Sir Alex. Galt, of Minister of Finance, and Sir Thomas Galt, the present Chief Justice of Ontario, and daughter of Mr. Daniel Lizar, of the firm of Lizar & Son, engravers and publishers, Edinburgh. She was born about 1820 at Ouellet's, Renfrew, Hutchison, and received her education in part in Edinburgh and partly at Jardine Hall, the residence of her uncle, Sir William Jardine. Mrs. Galt, when a young girl, sat on the knee of Sir John Galt, eldest son of Mr. John Galt, the novelist. She was a lady of charming manners and many accomplishments.

The residence of Henry Isaac, Stephen, was the scene of a pleasing and interesting affair on Wednesday. The subject of interest was the marriage of his second daughter, Eliza, to George Bawden, of Exeter. The ceremony was performed at 3 o'clock in the afternoon by the Rev. F. H. Falt in the presence of nearly 100 friends and relatives. The bride was assisted by her sister Nellie, while the groom was supported by Fred Dunford.

KENT.

Mr. Marx, of Chatham, has notified some of the councillors of that town that he proposes to enter an action to compel them to make good some \$6,000 of the consolidated debentures which he claims have been illegally used for purposes of that town not mentioned in the act.

A number of alleged gamblers were in the Chatham Police Court Wednesday, when it was shown that "cent ante" had been frequently played in a so-called gambling house. Judgment was reserved until Wednesday next.

Dr. Sampson, who some two weeks ago, removed from Blenheim to Windsor, was tendered a citizens' banquet at his former home on Thursday evening and presented with a solid gold watch. The affair took place at the Sheldon House, and was attended by over 100 persons, among them being Arch. Campbell, M.P.P., R. Ferguson, M.P.P., and prominent citizens of the county. Letters of regret were read from Sir Oliver Mowat, Hon. Wilfred Laurier and others. The usual toast was given and responded to, and it was easily discernable that in the departure of the guest of the evening Blenheim had lost one of her best citizens. For nearly a quarter of a century Dr. Sampson has been a prominent figure in Western Ontario, and has been engaged in a number of political struggles. His friends are legion, and the sentiments expressed at the banquet were that he would at some not far distant day return to Blenheim.

MIDDLESEX.

Rev. Mr. Stewart, of North Gower, has accepted a call to the pastorate of Melbourn and Riverside, London Presbytery. Rev. D. C. Chapman, a Methodist minister, who was well known in Middlesex, died in Toronto recently. He was 73 years of age. Mrs. Chapman passed away a month or so prior to his decease.

Douglas; secretary-treasurer, E. Ironside. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the retiring president.

Thos. Elmes, Princeton, sold a load of Alsike clover seed recently to a Hamilton firm, for which he received \$400.

Princetonians are talking of establishing a pork-packing industry in their midst.

PERTH.

The North American Mill Building Company, of Stratford, has secured the contract for a \$500,000 roller mill to be erected in West Toronto Junction. The contract is to be got out with a rush, and will be filled in about two months.

Mrs. Johnston, St. Marys, was stricken with paralysis the other evening. She was up to the time of the stroke, apparently in good health, and was attending her daughter, Mrs. Gallinger, of East Nissouri, who was ill. She is slowly improving.

WATERLOO.

The Waterloo County Council have ordered from England a coat of arms for the Berlin court house to cost \$125.

The number of persons in Berlin, per 1,000, who are entitled to vote at municipal elections is a little over 200.

WELLINGTON.

A. Smith, Mimosa, has tracked a poultry thief who has been suspected of stealing poultry from a barnyard in that section lately. He will likely be prosecuted.

A TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE.

Attacked by Highwaymen and Crav-
ing Home With Life and Arms
Frostbitten.

SHAMOKIN, Pa., Jan. 13.—A thrilling struggle with highwaymen and a terrible journey with the thermometer at 8° below zero, will probably result in Albert Mack's legs and arms being amputated, if he recovers sufficiently to stand the operation.

Tuesday afternoon he left here in a sleigh for Bear Gap. At dusk he commenced the return trip. The wind, blowing 50 miles an hour, caused high banks of snow to form on the mountain road. After traveling five miles Mack found that he was being overtaken by the cold, and, whipping up his horse, he began a race against death by freezing.

Finally he reached the Shamokin Mountain, about half dead, when two masked men sprang from behind a tree and ordered him to throw up his hands. When he said he had no money they attacked him with clubs and left him senseless. For hours he lay in a snowdrift, and on recovering found his legs, arms and face frozen. Then commenced a terrible journey through the storm to the place awaiting most of the way. When he reached a lively stable he was half crazed and tried to hug a red-hot stove, but was stopped by an attendant.

He is now at home in a horrible condition. The doctors scarcely know whether or not it is advisable to deprive him of his useless arms and legs, which are totally black and swelled to enormous size.

The horse was found in the mountain Wednesday afternoon almost frozen.

To Protect the Seals.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 13.—In the Senate to-day Mr. Sherman, from the Committee on Foreign Relations, reported back the Senate Bill, introduced by him on Dec. 20, to extend to the North Pacific Ocean, the provisions of the statutes for protection of fur seals and other fur bearing animals, and after brief explanation the bill was passed.

Necessity of Tariff Reform.

KINGSTON, Jan. 13.—Members of the Board of Trade will ask for a meeting to discuss tariff reform on the line of the following resolutions: "That Canada's principal market, England, being open free of duty to all Canadian products, and in view of the general and ever-increasing depression existing among the agricultural community of this country, we, the Kingston Board of Trade, recommend the abolition, or at least a reduction, of the import tax on agricultural machinery, implements, tools and all raw material imported from the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland."
