LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Twelve new members were received
into the First Congregational Church on
Sunday.

—The race which was to have taken place
at Westminster rink last evening has been
postponed until Friday evening.

—Miss Hargreaves, of Winnipeg, Man.,
who has been on a business trip to Toronto
and London, returned home yesterday.

—Rev. A. W. Main, Congregational
evangelist, will commence a two weeks'
mission in the First Congregational Church
next Sunday.

—Mr. and Mrs. Currie, of Watertown,
Dak., who have been visiting their daugh-
ter, Mrs. W. J. Stinton, of this city, and
other friends in this vicinity during the
winter, returned to their home yesterday.

—Mr. William Betts, graduate of the
shortland business departments of the
Forest City Business College, of this city,
has accepted a position as stenographer in
the office of the Flint and Pere Marquette
Railway, Saginaw, Mich.

—A Toronto telegram says the wardens
of Christ Church, Amherstburg, to-day
obtained from Chief Justice Galt an in-
junction restraining Dean Jones, of London,
and Rev. Alfred Brown from investigating
the financial affairs of the church.

—The Colborne Street Methodist Church
of this city at its February official meeting
had before it a resolution speaking in the
very highest terms of their present pastor,
the Rev. Charles Smith, and unanimously
requesting him to remain with them and
complete the full Methodist triennial term
of three years. Mr. Smith in reply recip-
rocalized the kindly feelings, and said that
he had no desire to sever his connection
with them before the cast iron wheel of
their itinerant system redoted it absolutely
indispensable.

—Trebilcock vs. Walsh and Trebilcock
was decided in the Queen's Bench and Common Pleas Divisional
Court on Saturday, the defendants contending
that under R. S. C. chap. 159, sec. 9 (c),
the receipt of the money by the stakeholder
was a misdemeanor, in respect of which all
three parties were in pari delicto, and that,
therefore, the stakes could not be recovered.
The Divisional Courts held that the wager
was unquestionably illegal, and that, there-
fore, the money is recoverable, having been
demanded from the stakeholders be-
fore being paid over. Held, also, that bets
between individuals are excluded from the
operation of R. S. C. chap. 159, sec. 9 (c),
the court refusing to construe the ambigu-
ous wording of the act so as to create a new
offense. On all grounds the motions were
dismissed with costs. W. R. Meredith,
Q. C., for the appeals; Aylesworth, Q. C.,
and McKillop (London), for the plaintiff,
contra.

Rosina Vokes Last Night.

An audience, large, fashionable and ap-
preciative, greeted the ever-popular Rosina
Vokes at the Grand last night. The per-
formance consisted of three one-act
comediettes. The first was a charming
serio-comic piece from the pen of Jerome
K. Jerome, produced here before by the
late Miss Morris. It is a masterpiece of
valuable acquisition to the company, showed
fine emotional abilities. The second, "A
Double Lesson," introduced Miss Vokes
and Mr. Felix Morris. The former was
seen at her best; the role calls for the
greatest versatility. Mr. Felix
Morris' character acting was admirable.
Last but not least came "The Lord in
Livery," which is not unknown here, and
as a mirth provoker is unexcelled. Miss
Vokes' refreshing originality and magnetic
personality were never better displayed.
She is peerless in the realm of high, pure
comedy. Mr. Felix Morris' impersonation
of the butler in "The Lord in Livery" has
made him famous. It was simply irre-
sistible. Miss Vokes has surrounded her-
self with artists of ability; there is not a
weak spot. Walter Granville is an actor
of fine appearance and first-class talent. Mr.
Gottschalk's comedy work was highly satis-
factory.

Colborne Street Methodist Church.

The services of this church, while always
interesting and profitable, were, however,
on Sunday the 5th inst., of unusual im-
portance. Some three weeks ago the
pastor, Rev. Chas. Smith, made a special
appeal by printed circular and by pulpit
announcement for the very best offering
anniversary for the year. Yesterday at
the church from the first to the last, the
response was most noble, and the results
when told up after the services were over
showed a total contributed for the day in
cash or its equivalent of over \$1,000. The
amounts were given in offerings ranging
from 50 cents to \$100, the marked success
of the occasion is proof alike of the energy
of the pastor and of the true Christian de-
votion of the members of the church and its
adherents. At the morning service the
pastor preached a sermon of a most inspi-
ring character on the Psalmist's words,
"Blessed the Lord, O my soul." He argued
especially for more soul in all Christian
service. Songs, sermons, prayers, praises,
offerings were only efficient in the highest
degree and truly acceptable to God when
they were characterized by soulfulness. In
the evening the pastor, Rev. Chas. Smith,
again occupied the pulpit, and preached
another sermon of a series on "Wild Oats,"
in which the young people of the church
and vicinity are taking deep interest. The
text was the eighth verse of the fourth
chapter in the Book of Job, the words,
"I have seen that they that plow iniquity
and sow wickedness, reap the same." The
discourse was in special an arraignment of the sin of
impurity; it intimated upon the pledge of the
White Cross movement, viz., "A white life
for two." It showed that springtime,
plowing and sowing, in the moral as in the
natural domain, meant summer growths
and autumn harvests. If in youth indi-
viduals sowed leanness and belatedness and
luxuriousness, they would reap the barren-
ness and the withering of old age.

for a kindly-natured little gentleman whose
specialty in this world was the quiet enjoy-
ment of the good things in it. But the

flowing with the brightness of life, and he
spreads around the sunshiny that lightens
and blesses his own existence. In the old
feudal days, when the royal jester was the
one man who dared sometimes to tell his
master the truth though hidden in
witty phrase, Marshall P. Wilder
would have stood near some kingly
throne and worn the silken and velvet
doublet that marked the prince of laugh-
makers. Living in the busy world of to-
day, he has become the petted though un-
spoiled favorite of society, and the merriest
little mortal that the country loves. He is
heavenly, and he might be said to be all
that the big world would know from his
looks. He will always be young and he
will always be funny. He not only says
funny things, but he acts them and he
enjoys the fun himself. He was born so
and he cannot help it, and the world will
always rejoice that he cannot, for the world
has some laughing more and more the

From Egypt to Jerusalem.

The Queen's Avenue Methodist Church
was well filled last night with an audience
assembled to hear Rev. Mungo Fraser,
pastor of Knox Church, Hamilton, deliver
an interesting lecture entitled "From Egypt
to Jerusalem." Rev. Charles Smith opened
the meeting with prayer, after which the

any other day. After leaving Port Said
they came to the far famed Joppa. From
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
